George McWhirter Dies in Edmonton

A native of Georgetown, George McWhirter, died in Edmonton last week at the age of 72. He was a brother of the late Ed McWhirter of Georgetown, who was manager of the Old Paper Mill.

Mr. McWhirter moved west to Brandon, Man., in 1910. In 1915 he went to Peace River and then to Edmonton in 1919. He was an active member of the Conservative party and was in the insurance and retail grocery business until his retirement in 1949. For some time he was the official receiver for the Edmonton Judicial district under the federal Farmers' Creditors' arrangement act, and vacated that post in 1936.

He is survived by his widow, one daughter, Mrs. Gordon (Doris) Robbins of Edmonton; one brother Charles of Calgary; two sisters, Mrs. James Stewart of San Pedro, Calif., and Mrs. A. E. King, of Calgary; also four grandchildren.

The funeral service was held in Edmonton. Dr. D. C. Ramsey officiated and burial was in the Mount Pleasant Cemetery.
