WHAT COUNCIL DID
Study Location for Mill Waste Lagoon
Possibility of easing the problem of mill waste odour was mentioned by Mayor Hyde to council on Monday.
The mayor said it might be possible to control industrial waste disposal by piping paper mill waste to the eastern town limits where a lagoon could be created in the vicinity of the present sanitary landfill site. Odour here would be at a minimum and prevailing winds would be in the town's favour, he said.
He had discussed this briefly with the Alliance Paper management and has been assured that every cooperation would be given, he said.
Asked by Cr. Burke if it might be possible to use the present sewage lagoon in the Delrex area, the mayor said piping would not be possible nor would that location have the wind in its favour.
The public works committee was empowered to arrange a meeting with representatives of the two papermills, the Conservation Authority and the Ontario Water Resources Commission to discuss this.
