WHAT COUNCIL DID
Sidewalk Displays Soon to Disappear

Changes in Georgetown's traffic by-law are being discussed by council's road committee. Parallel parking on both sides of Main St. will necessitate a by-law amendment and with narrower sidewalks, legislation is also being considered prohibiting merchandise displays in front of stores.

Mentioning this at Monday's council meeting, Mayor Hyde also said there is possibility of re-routing buses down Maple Ave. to Main Street with improvements made at the Maple-Main corner for buses to turn.

A bad year for tree pests. Cr. Cass explained when queried about dead trees among those planted recently on Sargent Rd. Cr. Cass said the trees would be replaced.

Although the town has no official concern with sidewalks installed in the Delrex subdivision, Mayor Hyde said it is a shame that they are falling to pieces and wondered if control could be exercised in construction. The walks are paid for by the house purchasers.

Asphalt is being used for patching wherever possible, the town engineer explained, but some walks have sunk as much as six inches and are beyond this treatment.

Permit for a tag day was granted to the hospital on Sept. 22 and 23 . . . Claims for a child's dental work caused in a fall at the swimming pool and for car repair when a car struck a building were turned over to the insurance firm. They were submitted by A. Valk, 20 Arletta St. and Harold Fourmier, 55 Weber Dr. No decision was made on whether a council member would attend a civil defence school at Arrprior this fall. Deputy Reeve Elliott attended last year.

A three-time attendance is required for firemen to be admitted into the life member ship.

Conditions
Cr. Cass disagreed with taking a step based on present conditions which doesn't adequately take care of future planning. "This may be a useful way of overcoming expensive services, but I think we could get by with temporary services to No. 1 site without much difference," he said. He wanted a more accurate cost estimate of both sites, while Cr. Brown said he would like a written refusal from Delrex for a meeting. Cr. Cass maintained that the original site should be discussed with Delrex and if the firm wanted to discuss other things at the same time this would be in order too. "Council has adamantly refused this year to discuss anything with the company and this is a continuation of that action," he stated. Mayor Hyde said the school site is a specific problem for the property committee and the company is trying to confuse the issue by bringing in other matters. "The company isn't alone in trying to confuse the issue," retorted Mr. Cass. "Possibly you are alone, I'm not," replied the mayor. The mayor explained that cost estimates on servicing both sites would be obtained, but meanwhile he would put the purchase offer to motion. "If the offer is accepted it doesn't preclude a change of mind if figures indicate the other site is more economical," he said. On a recorded vote the purchase offer passed by a 5-4 majority. Reeve, Sargent and Cr. Cass, Burke and Brown voted against the motion.
