BUILDING PERMIT FOR MARIETTA

The American Marietta Co. moved another step closer to locating in town when council was asked on Tuesday to grant permission to Canadian National Railways to cross Armstrong Ave. with a railway siding.

The siding has already been constructed at a time when Delrex Development owned the land. Since that time Armstrong Ave. has been devoted to the town and council's action is a formality to legalize the railway's position.

Mayor Hyde expressed further optimism about the company locating in town when he said that only that day a company man had picked up a building permit.

American Marietta has optioned a Delrex acreage until the end of August.

Flowers Bloom On Main Street

Shoppers enjoyed a touch of colour last week-end when a row of colourful flowers appeared one morning along the southeast block.

Sidewalks had been removed that day for relocation of gas company lines prior to new sidewalks, and the flowers (artificial) caused a deal of good natured comment.

Yearly Bill \$92,000 Until It's Paid For

Total cost of Georgetown's new sewage disposal plant will pass the \$900,000 mark when a lift station in the Delrex industrial area is completed. And the town will receive a yearly billing from the Ontario Water Resources Commission of some \$92,000 until the project is paid for.

Mr. Palmer and Mr. Joint of the OWRC has billed the town for \$74,000 as the 1961 bill. Mr. Joint who is account for the OWRC explained: "Our water rate increase was not made as soon as we hoped, \$888,468. Original estimate was \$825,000 but this did not in available for payments this year. Our estimate for 1961 is \$92,000. Would Class Zeller's As Department Store

Six Day Operation Would Then Be Legal

At Tuesday's council meeting, Mr. Cass made a strong plea to have the Zeller's department store classified as a department store which would allow the firm to operate for its own business hours.

Regarding the time, Mr. Cass explained that if located in a store now, it would be open on a six-day week, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

The town by-law allows each store to be open for a maximum of 12 hours. It would be an asset in classification of merchant stores, closing hours by a majority of the town. Mr. Cass said that as a department store, Zeller's would be the only one of its class and could thus apply for its own hours.

The planning committee which Mr. Cass mentioned recently discussed the matter and other contractors. "We have done at that time had recommended that the firm be classified as a department store," Mr. Cass explained.

The store would have 21,000 sq. ft. of floor space, the same as the area as the Marietta firm is talking and would require \$85,000 in stock, according to the plan.

Council Sets Date For Delrex Committee Meeting

A proposed meeting of council-Delrex meeting if the firm proceeded with further court action with officials of Delrex Development has been set for Tuesday, August 22nd.

Council a few weeks ago voted to meet with the firm providing assurance was given by the town solicitor that the town's position in any litigation would not be endangered. The assurance was received, and at Tuesday's council meeting, Cr. Bob Burke said he felt such a meeting should be held before August 27th. Cr. Ian Cass and Reve Dore Sargent supported Cr. Burke's position while Mayor Hyde and Cr. Wan F. Hunter opposed any meeting until after August 27th.

Cr. Hunter said every councillor should be present at a meeting and it is difficult to arrange a full meeting during holidays.

Mayor Hyde, who opposed the meeting in the past, pointed out that the appeal date has no bearing on the matter as the discussion as to "Without prejudice"

"If it does pass the appeal date, how could it be without prejudice?" asked Cr. Burke.

"Do you mean that you think our meeting could influence any court proceeding?" replied the mayor.
