## Former Local Resident Was Noted Agriculturalist

J. R. Gordon Sutherland, 51, agricultural scientist and assistant manager of the agricultural division of Cyanamid International of New York died on July 30th at Cedar Grove, New Jersey after a short illness.

A graduate of Georgetown High School, he later attended Guelph OAC, McGill University and the University of Manitoba, specializing in entomology. He served overseas during the second world war with the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry. He was a native of St. Catharines.

**Near Limehouse**  
Mr. Sutherland's father was a doctor who lived on the present Paul Spitzer farm near Limehouse and had his office on Main Street in the house now occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Charles Robinson.

After the war, Mr. Sutherland served as director of agriculture for the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration in Rome. In 1946, he led a team of specialists to Sardinia in an attempt to wipe out a locust plague. Later he served as senior agricultural officer for the British Colonial Service in Nigeria.

**To New York**  
He returned to Canada for further studies at the University of Manitoba and then joined American Cyanamid Co. He moved to New York with Cyanamid International several years ago.

He leaves his wife, the former Anna M. Cran of Winnipeg, two children and a brother Dr. John L. Sutherland of Leekport, Nova Scotia.
