# Do YOU require a RETAIL SALES TAX VENDOR'S PERMIT?

Retailers, wholesalers, manufacturers and all others who sell goods as a normal part of their business must apply for a Retail Sales Tax Vendor's Permit.

You are required to have your Permit by September 1st, when The Ontario Retail Sales Tax Act goes into effect. If you do not have this Permit, you will be unable to buy tax-free the taxable goods you purchase for resale. Also, if you sell goods after August 31st without being registered as a vendor you will be in default under the Retail Sales Tax Act.

It is in your own best interest to fill out and return the official Application Form at once. Otherwise, you will not be sure of receiving your Permit before the final deadline of September 1st.

With your Vendor's Permit you will receive a convenient summary of The Retail Sales Tax Act as it affects your particular line of business.

APPLY NOW to be sure of receiving your Vendor's Permit before September 1st.

PERMIT APPLICATIONS ALREADY RECEIVED ARE BEING PROCESSED AND WILL BE ISSUED ON AND AFTER AUGUST 18, AND BEFORE SEPTEMBER 1.
