All Delegates were Welcomed, Dined and Entertained wonderfully by the Branches in the District. In the usual democratic manner of our Great Organization Pros and Cons of resolutions were discussed thoroughly at the Alexandra Hall, twice daily.

FACTS FROM THE CONVENTION.

- The Legion contributes \$20,000 a year to the development of young athletes.
- Legion Housing Developments costing \$2 million provide low rental dwellings for older veterans.
- The total value of Legion Scholarships and Bursaries exceeds \$65,000 a year.
- Over 16,000 veterans and dependants have been assisted by the Legion's Service Bureau since 1946.
- Last year the Legion's Service Bureau enabled individual Canadians to obtain \$213,000 in pensions and allowances.
