### Rooms Guttled in Farmhouse Blaze

Fire of unknown origin gutted part of the 10th line farm of M. D. McPherson Tuesday.

Fire chief Bob Benfield told the Herald that a summer kitchen on the back of the brick farmhouse was completely destroyed by the flames which also razed a power lawn mower and a boys bicycle stored there. The frame part of the house included three small rooms and an upstairs. All were charred in the blaze.

The fire was burning strongly by the time the Georgetown firemen arrived on the scene but was under control in minutes. The main part of the house suffered no damage. No estimate was made of the loss.

The farm, the former Lorne Cleave farm, is situated at the corner of the 10th line, and No. 10 sideroad, near Norval's Hillcrest Cemetery.

### WHAT COUNCIL DID

#### Initiate Action to Clear Credit River of Pollution

Ask Health Unit To Order Job Done

Action on clearing up contamination of the Credit River from an overflowing temporary sewage lagoon was initiated Monday when council instructed Public Works chairman Don Barragan to contact Halton Health Unit and the Ontario Water Resources Commission and have them order the town to have the situation corrected.

The question hinges on a legal point according to Mayor Hyde who warned that the town could be in a difficult position if it acted on its own in repairing a sewer line on private property.

The lagoon is a temporary measure to handle sewage from part of the Delrex industrial area and was created by an agreement between Delrex Developments and the OWRC, the mayor claims.

Cr. Ian Cass moved for immediate action on a matter which he said 'has existed longer than I care to say in public.'

He said it would only be a small job for the town to clear a blocked line which should carry sewage to the lagoon — 'and it reflects badly on council not to correct this.'

'There's a river of raw sewage running down the hill and we have a responsibility to our Norval neighbours' said Cr. Burke who said the pipe should be fixed and discussion on who would pay for it later.

The danger in this, said the mayor, is that it might establish ownership by the town who could be in the position of eventually having to bypass the lagoon and pipe sewage to the treatment plant. This should be done, he said, but not at the town's expense.

Order Work Done  
Council decided to ask the health unit to order the work done. The town could then order the Delrex firm to proceed and if they did not, could do the work themselves and bill the firm.

Asking the cost of a sewer line from lagoon to treatment plant, Cr. Barragan was told it would be about \$3,000.

'If we were ordered to do this, we would have to expropriate an easement before we could go on Delrex land, but this could be done rapidly,' he was told by the mayor.
