Many Local Children Attend Camp Artaban

RELIGION, FUN, MIX AT ANCESTER CAMP

Many local children of St. George's parish and their friends have had the advantage of a healthful and active training in leadership at Camp Artaban, located in the rolling hills between the towns of Dundas and Ancaster. The late Venerable A. T. P. Holmes, Archdeacon of Lunenburg and Welland, came east from Western Canada in the thirties and started the ball rolling for a permanent camp. In 1941 the present site among the rolling hills of Ancaster was purchased and a "Tent City" of youngsters held forth at the site for that summer, on a permanent basis.

His dynamic leadership drew scores of volunteer workers to the cause and together they built not only excellent buildings that dot the camp site, but also created the spirit and traditions of Camp Artaban that prevail to this day. Continued improvements at the camp reached a high point in 1957 when the lovely rustic outdoor chapel was dedicated and the tremendous natural stream swimming pool was built at a cost of over \$30,000.00.

Founders Ashes Beneath the handsome stone altar lie the ashes of the beloved padre, founder of Camp Artaban, Ancaster, and the whole camp continues as a living memorial to the zeal and vision of "Padre" Holmes. His intention was never that Camp Artaban should provide just a happy holiday for girls and boys, although that is part of its purpose. His intention was that the campers should enjoy the experience of Christian community living, with all its joys and opportunities for self-expression. On many occasions he expressed his delight in the fact that the camp gave an opportunity to many young Christian men and women to exercise their talents for leadership.

The average day begins and ends with prayer. Campers worship in the chapel each morning and the service is conducted by a chaplain of the camp in session. Each day has its own theme and is put on by one of the groups, then after "lights out" the leaders use the quiet that follows to assess the values of the day. Thanks is offered for the good things realized as Christians living together and the "Hill" is reminded that each new day brings fresh opportunities to serve.

Plenty to Eat Throughout the day each campers enjoy a variety of competition with their fellow campers in baseball, pud dock, volleyball, rounders and soccer. Twice daily there are swimming periods. Handicrafts are enjoyed by both girls and boys. The girls excel in dramatics and choral singing, while the boys enjoy nature hikes and organic camp skills for their nightly program. Three excellent meals a day and a nightly snack help take care of vigorous appetites. Meals are prepared by a professional cook and served by volunteer assistants. Everyone shares in the dish washing and table setting chores. Rigid daily inspection of the work and the condition of the huts and grounds insures a spic and span camp at all times and healthy competition among the groups for daily points that are awarded.

Each camp has a director and his or her assistant. The Chaplain is in charge of the spiritual life of the campers. The registered nurse is in residence at the camp hospital and arrangement is made with Ancaster doctors for any emergency. Leaders come from all walks of life, many of whom attended Camp Artaban as campers themselves in earlier days. A qualified life guard is on duty at the swimming pool when it is in use. Camp Artaban is governed by a board of directors of which the present president is the Reverend F. J. Bartlett, P.A., rector of St. John Evangelist church in Hamilton.

All Denominations The Camp registrar receives registrations from children of every denomination and a number of children from the Hamilton Children's Aid Society attend camp every year. The fees are modest and includes health and accident insurance governing the period spent in camp.

Visitors days are arranged throughout the summer, when visitors may bring picnic lunches and stay for evening in the chapel.

Camp Artaban has served in the east for twenty five years and the Ancaster Artaban has been located on its present site for twenty years. The original Camp Artaban is located on Long Bay in Howe Sound, British Columbia.

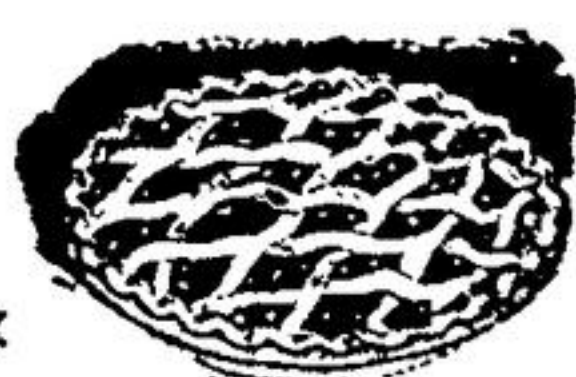
