Four Extra Votes For Southern Municipalities

County Will Adopt New Vote Procedure

A proposal to change the existing voting method at County Council was endorsed by a majority of the members at a special meeting last week.

After lengthy and heated discussion the proposal, the third that day, was finally passed, and will be sent to the Private Bills Committee of the Legislature. Additional representation for Burlington and the amalgamated Oakville-Trafalgar was asked, with a Reeve and three Deputy Reeves, for each of the two municipalities, with two votes each, being recommended.

This system would give the southern portion sixteen votes, as opposed to their present 12, leaving the northern portion with their present number, sixteen.

The present inequality in voting power came about when Bronte and Nelson lost representation due to amalgamation, and the forthcoming Oakville-Trafalgar merger would have further aggravated the situation. It was this merger which finally prompted this action, which had been considered for some time. This motion passed 16 to 12, with almost a complete north-south split.

Caledon News Makes Bankruptcy Assignment

The Caledon Pictorial News made a bankruptcy assignment on August 8th and a meeting of creditors has been called for August 28th in Owen Sound court house.

The publication which was published in Orangeville, attempted to cover the Orangeville, Brampton and Georgetown area with a tabloid weekly newspaper, and was distributed free to homes in the area. Donald A. Campbell and Clyde V. Scott were partners in the business.

Originally a printed newspaper, it was later reproduced by offset, and ceased publication after the Caledon Fair which was a promotion venture of the publishers.

The bankruptcy notice lists creditors in a total of \$21,968.58,

of which \$4,701.90 are secured or preferred creditors and the balance unsecured.
