Progress Ousts Beauty

More than once lately we have shed a tear for blots on nature's beauty inflicted by man's progress.

Lovely Norval village has suffered stab wounds which will take years to obliterate. An avenue of lovely shade trees has disappeared, the pretty winding approach to the village, nestled between two hills, is being replaced, and a stand of pine and spruce has been cut down.

It couldn't be otherwise, and no one is to blame, unless it is the inventor of the automobile, for it is today's emphasis on highway travel safety which has forced the change. Even those who most mourn the change know in their hearts that it had to be. A look at the police accident files is proof enough that winding, tree-shaded highways are incompatible with highway transportation.

Georgetown's western town Lambs will not escape either, and rows of surveyors" stakes on either side apparently spell doom to that tree shaded approach which has been a cool pasis for travellers for langer than most of us can remember.



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
