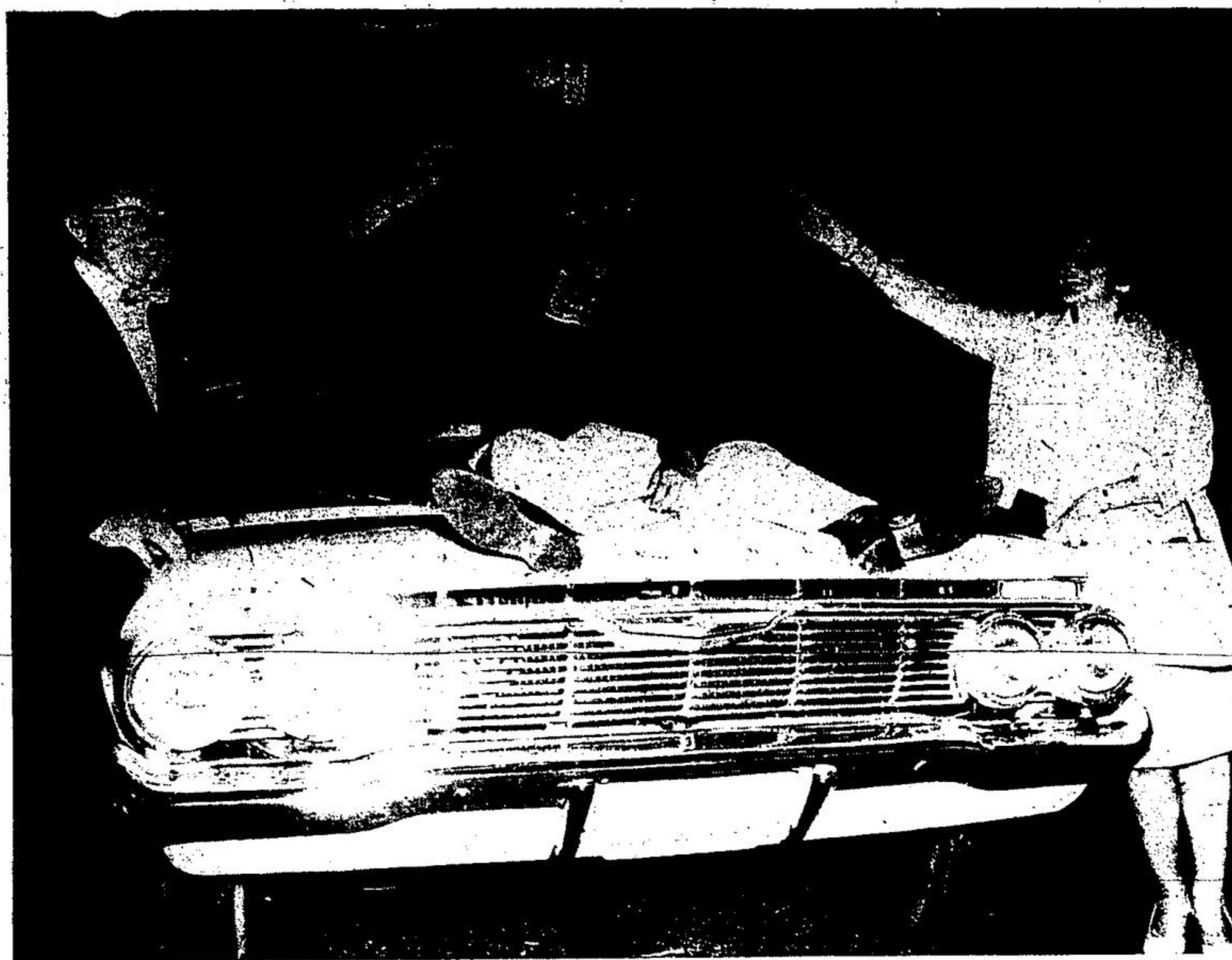

NOTICE
THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE ROMAN CATHOLIC SEPARATE SCHOOLS FOR THE TOWN OF GEORGETOWN BY-LAW NUMBER 22

A By-Law to authorize the issue of Debentures in the principal amount of \$85,000 to provide money for the construction and equipment of a new school.

TAKE NOTICE that the above mentioned Board of Trustees on the 14th day of August, 1961, passed By-Law Number 22 to authorize the borrowing of money by the issue and sale of Debentures of the said Board of Trustees in the principal amount of \$85,000.

1. The purpose for which the money is to be borrowed is to pay the cost of the construction and equipment of a new Roman Catholic Separate School in the Town of Georgetown.

2. The amount to be borrowed is \$85,000 on the security of the said Debentures, which shall be a charge upon the schoolhouse property and premises and any other real or personal property vested in the said Board of Trustees and upon the separate school rates collectible by the said Board of Trustees.

3. The Debentures are to be dated September 15, 1961 and are to be payable in instalments of principal on September 15 in the years 1962 to 1981, both inclusive, as follows:
