Property chairman Jim Emerson said his committee has this under consideration, but is concerned about supervision of a playground is established. The school board is hesitant to have equipment on school property for use other than school hours, he said.

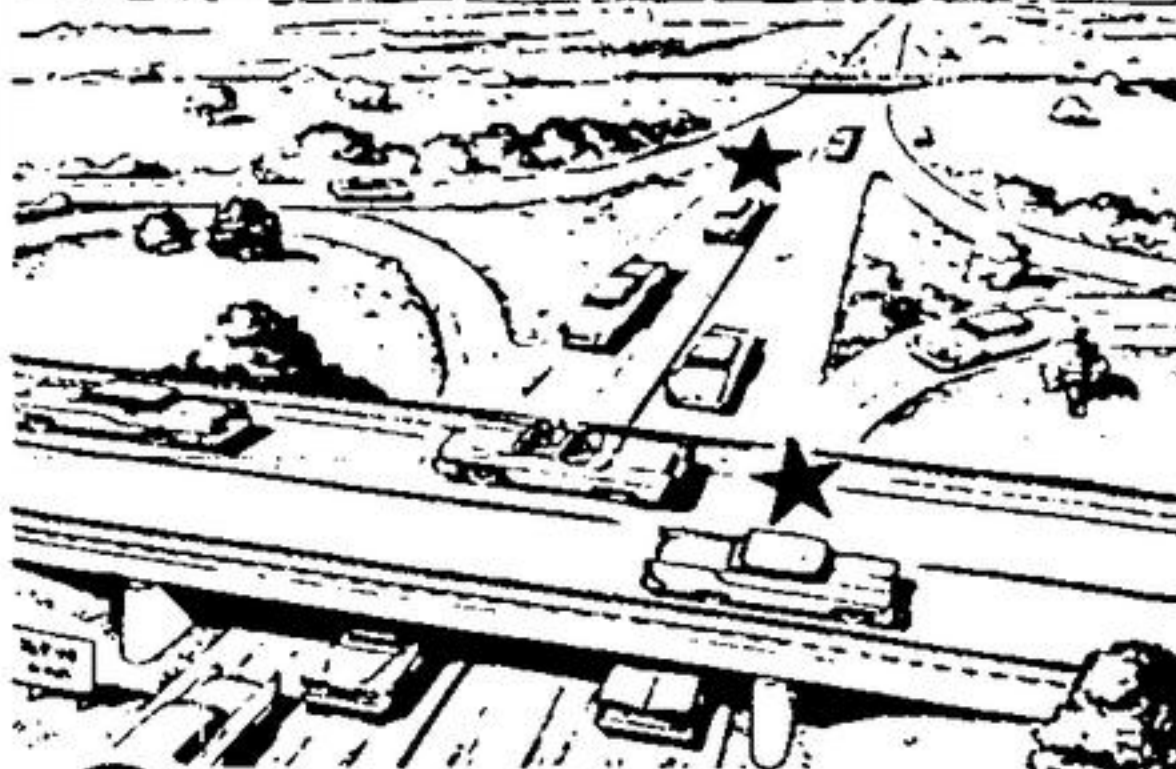
