Consider Heavier Type School Lockers

"When is a locker not a locker?" after the abuse suffered during a school term, the High School board learned Monday night. At least fifty locker doors will have to be replaced.

WHAT COUNCIL DID Cost of Sewers Council Query

"It seems unfair if we can't have sanitary sewers because we need them, yet can't afford to pay for them," said Clarence Collins, 257 Guelph St., when he asked council for details Monday on a possible sewer extension to six houses of Guelph Street.

The properties were in Esquewaux Township originally and were incorporated into town at the time of the Delrex annexation. Recently two ratepayers asked council to consider serving the houses with sewers and were told that a petition of residents would be necessary.

Mayor Hyde explained that town sewers had originally been installed as a local improvement with the town paying one-third of the cost and property owners the balance.

Costs of extensions since then had been assessed on a similar basis, he said. In this case, a cost of \$3.78 per foot frontage would be paid by the six residents over a ten year period.

Ted Conover Taking Over Lorne Scot Post

The Lorne Scots (Peel, Halton and Dufferin Regiments) will have a new commanding officer next October 1st, when Major E. F. Conover, C.D., of Brampton, takes over from Lt. Col. Arthur Kemp, C.D., Burlington. Col. Kemp has been in command of the regiment since Dec. 15, 1937, and is now transferred to the supplementary reserve list.

On assuming command Maj. Conover will take the rank of lieutenant colonel. A parade of the regiment will be held in Rosalea Park at noon on Sunday, Oct. 1 when the change of command ceremonies will take place. The change of command was revealed when the unit applied to town council for permission to use Rosalea Park. Permission was granted.

Major Conover joined the Peel & Dufferin Regiment in 1935, transferring to the Lorne Scots in 1936 at the time of amalgamation. From 1940 to 1942 he was in the Canadian Officers' Training Corps at the Ontario Agricultural College and received his commission here.

In July, 1942, he was transferred to active service and served in Canada, the United Kingdom and Italy. He was discharged from active service in November, 1944.

In 1950 he rejoined the Lorne Scots as a captain and since 1957 has been second in command of the regiment.

Major Conover is registrar in Peel County of the Supreme Court of Ontario and clerk of the county court.

His father, Lt. Col. R. V. Conover of Meadowdale is a former commanding officer of the regiment. He commanded the Peel and Dufferin Regiment from 1922 to 1925 and the Lorne Scots from 1939 to 1942.
