WHAT COUNCIL DID Dispute Responsibility For Sewer Extension

Who will pay for a sewer connection from a Delrex lagoon to the new disposal plant is still a matter of conjecture.

Recently town council asked the Water Resources Commission to order the job done, with implications that if this was not done by Delrex Development the town would do the job and bill the company.

At the Sept. 5th council meeting, correspondence was read from the OWRC, including a copy of a letter from a law firm representing Delrex which demanded responsibility and offered the town an easement across its property for the sewer line.

While saying immediate action must be taken, OWRC declined to judge the legal position of town and company.

"We hope the two parties can come to an understanding and have the work done immediately," the letter said. Cr Ian Cass wondered if the lagoon should not be retained for emergency use, but he was told OWRC is against this.

Council will get the town solicitor's opinion on this question.
