## OUTDOORS SPORTSMEN

Last week, while attending a trap shooting competition at Brampton for the Labatt's trophy it was my pleasure to meet some members of one of southern Ontario's most active conservation clubs, namely the Peel County Game and Fish Protective Association.

This club was formed in 1946, as a non-profit organization whose chief conservation aim has been to propagate, raise and release pheasants throughout Peel and surrounding counties.

The club has its own facilities for raising game birds, including incubators, brooder houses and pens to house the birds until they reach a suitable age for release.

The club also carried on experiments with other types of game birds with not too much success, such as raising and releasing partridge and turkeys. Assistance is given also in the backing of streams.

Together with pheasants, the club has a deer pen, six types Canadian geese, ducks and many other fancy birds.

The club's latest acquisition, of which we are justly proud, is the former Brampton Gun Club, which leased property from a Peel County Game & Fish Protective Assoc.

This is probably the finest Trap Club in Ontario, consisting of two electric Western style traps, and one of the three Olympic traps in Canada.

For the convenience of their members, they have a fully equipped club house which includes a lounge, gun room, office, kitchen and washrooms.

In the process of being renovated is a 25, 50, and 100 yard all bore rifle range. The club is located on the Hart Lake road, south of No. 7 Highway.

This fall some 3,500 pheasants will be released in Esquesing and Chinguacousy Townships.

The pheasants being released by the Georgetown Club this year are being tagged and all hunters are asked to return tagged birds to A. H. Georgetown, to the Georgetown Anglers and Hunters Association.

This is very important, as it will have a bearing on the number of pheasants released next year by the club.

Lately I've been in so many discussions on the merits of this Hunter Safety training program, but in none of the discussions has anyone bothered to suggest something that would be better. Do you any suggestions? I'd like to hear about them when your suggestion may be the solution.
