Choose Streetsville Teacher New Democratic Candidate

Douglas Draws Large Crowd to Burlington

Carl Rouleau, 41 year old Streetsville high school teacher, was chosen as candidate for the New Democratic Party in Halton at a crowded convention in the auditorium of the Thomas A. Blakelock high school last Thursday night. His was the only nomination. The presence of T. C. 'Tommy' Douglas, CCF premier of Saskatchewan and head of the new party proved a big drawing card. About a thousand people thronged the hall, and many were turned away. Mr. Rouleau's nomination was moved by Fred Colbourne, president of the South Trafalgar New Democratic Party Club, and seconded by Ed Bruce, president of the Halton Labour Council. Kenneth Brydon, CCF member of the provincial legislature for the Beaches, Toronto, was chairman of the meeting.

Aware of Issues

This is a great honour and a great responsibility that this convention has placed upon my shoulders," said Mr. Rouleau, in his address of acceptance. "The time has come in our society when every candidate, regardless of party, must be gravely aware of the serious issues which face us today."

Make Comparisons

The speaker expressed his willingness to appear on panels with other candidates in the election campaign. "I believe every citizen who has the right to vote has the right to make comparisons of all the candidates," he said. "There is only one way you can lose your vote, and that is if you don't exercise your franchise. If you want to pick a winner in Halton I suggest that you vote for the New Democratic Party. Across this land there is a rising tide of anti-Diefenbaker sentiment, and this riding is not exempt from it. I think the contest will be between the New Democratic Party and the Liberals."

Each of the major political parties spent at least \$5,000,000 on its election campaign, Mr. Rouleau told the audience. He said the C.C.F. party had failed to attain power because it would not accept contributions from large corporations. "If I had the choice between the party dominated by money and the party dominated by unions, I would choose the one dominated by unions," he declared. "Never let us forget that without unions we would never enjoy the working conditions or standards of living that we do now."

The speaker accused both the Liberals and the Conservatives of failure to develop a planned approach to present-day problems. "We are rapidly approaching a psychological climate that is almost ready to accept the inevitability of war," he said. He urged control of international relations by the United Nations, and suggested that 10 per cent of the money Canada is spending on defence should be set aside to devise means for preserving peace. The New Democratic party was the only one dedicated to the ideals of planning for economic purposes and the preservation of peace, Mr. Rouleau believed.

"Mr. Rouleau has demonstrated that he is the kind of man who understands the problems of the people of this country," said Mr. Douglas, who was given a loud ovation. "This is the kind of man the people of Canada need in the House of Commons. I am counting on you to send him to parliament in the next election."

a guarantee of trade union rights. The battle of political democracy has to be fought in every generation to keep us from losing the things which our forefathers gave us. "The farmer today is no longer economically free," declared Mr. Douglas. "The worker today is no longer his own boss. Today our whole economy is increasingly in the hands of fewer and fewer people. In the middle of the twentieth century while we are politically free we are economically enslaved. More and more major decisions of our lives lie in the hands of a few people we never see. This is economic dictatorship in the midst of political democracy. The real government of Canada is the unseen government, those who control investment. They are the people who determine how the Canadian people will live, and what conditions will be."

Mr. Douglas pointed out that Canada had slipped to third place in the world's economy, having been overtaken and passed by Sweden. Canada's production in the past five years had gone down four per cent, and over five per cent of the country's labor force is unemployed in the summer and about 12 per cent in the winter. This situation the speaker branded as a disgrace. There is a need for several

million new houses in Canada, said Mr. Douglas in addition to new schools, hospitals and other institutions. There need be no unemployed able-bodied person in Canada, he declared. He charged that one-third of the labor force do not earn enough to maintain a decent standard of living. "For our own economic survival we have to have a planned economy," he declared. "If you're going to get the economy working again, you've got to start putting money in the pockets of the people who don't earn enough to have a decent standard of living."

Poverty and Unemployment

"If it was possible to mobilize our human and material resources to fight a war against tyranny," said Mr. Douglas, "Surely it is possible to mobilize these forces to fight a relentless war against poverty and unemployment." He urged the adoption of a complete health service for everyone in Canada. "I am asking you to elect a government to build in Canada a new society, with freedom from want, fear and discrimination," said the new party leader.

Seek \$52,000 to Pay Off Hospital Deficit

August Report Shows 314 Patients to Date

When final work is completed Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital building fund will have a deficit in the neighbourhood of \$52,000 according to a report to the board from administrator Graham Gilhooly Tuesday.

In the report which covered two and a half months of operation, up to the end of August, Mr. Gilhooly said that fairly accurate estimate of the deficit can be made now that the building is rapidly nearing completion. He said the figure was reasonably close to that anticipated when construction began. Some of the \$52,000, however, may be made up by grants from provincial and federal governments for one extra bed which would mean an additional \$10,000. Mr. Gilhooly stressed that there is still need for community support.

The report also yielded some interesting statistics: In 2 1/2 months the hospital has —

- Admitted 314 adults and children.
- Provided 1,910 days of care to patients.
- Had 73 births.
- Provided 440 days of care for newborns.
- Performed 2,000 units of work in the laboratory.
- Sent out 221 units of work for analysis as far away as Hollywood, California.
- In its X-ray department made 94 miniature chest X-rays and 317 other X-ray examinations.
- Made 81 fluorescence examinations.
- Had 274 emergency visits.
- Served a total of 11,364 meals.

The full time staff now numbers 116 and payroll for the two and a half months totalled \$64,451. Total expenses to the first of September were \$91,790.

Mr. Gilhooly said that the hospital was reasonably busy in all areas but the total patient days have been running well below what had been anticipated. Landscaping and seeding is now in progress, he said, and visitors are being urged to walk on the pavement.

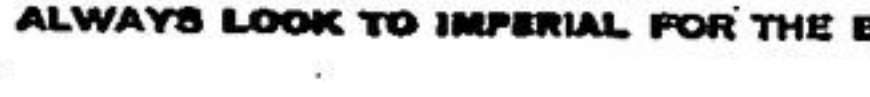
