### District Shorthorns Prominent at C.N.E.

In a strong showing of Dual Purpose Shorthorns at the C.N.E. the herds of C. A. Peacock, Milton and L. A. Humphries, Meadowdale, were keen contestants throughout.

The Peacock herd supplied the senior and grand champion cow. This was the seven year old Maple Lodge Rosemary 3rd, showing in the mature dry class. From the same herd came the reserve junior champion bull, Morlock Roseman 2nd, from the junior calf class. Peacock entries also placed third in the two year old bull class and second in the junior heifer class. The Humphries herd placed second and third in the mature bull class, and third in junior heifers. Their Sanford Royal Dairymaid 2nd, won the junior yearling female class, and went on to the junior championship.

### High Powered Rifles Prohibited in Hunting

The use of high powered rifles in a large part of southern Ontario is prohibited under a new hunting regulation which became effective Sept. 1st. It includes Halton County, Lands and Forests Minister, the Hon. J. W. Spooner, recognizing the serious problem which exists in more densely populated areas when such long range weapons are used, believes that the new regulations will reduce the possibility of gun accidents in southern Ontario. Mr. Spooner stated there is no game in southern Ontario for which a high powered rifle is essential. In most cases when a deer season is declared locally, hunting is restricted to the use of shotguns.

**Restriction**  
The restriction applies to the counties of Brant, Elgin, Essex, Haldimand, Halton, Huron, Kent, Lambton, Lincoln, Middlesex, Norfolk, Peel, Perth, Waterloo, Welland, Wellington, Wentworth and York. In these counties, while hunting under licence, a resident gun licence or a summer hunting licence, it is however not permissible to carry a gun for the purpose of hunting that is of greater calibre than a .275 rifle or, while hunting buck shot or ball shot, in any with a shotgun, to have in possession any shotgun shells loaded with shot larger than the hunter has a valid deer or number two shot. This would include in his possession include buckshot, SSG, and at the time Any person carrying a rifle must be in a place which also to non-residents hunting game inhabits is considered to be on a S21 licence to take be hunting the provisions of bear, fox, game birds and small the Game & Fisheries Act.
