Long Courses consisting of 14 nights:

Long Courses will consist of 14 two-hour lessons which will be given on Tuesdays or Wednesdays. Classes will begin on October 17 and 18 at 8 p.m. and will be held each following week until Nov. 28 and 29. They will recommence Jan. 9 and 10 and continue until Feb. 20 and 21. The basic fee for each long course is \$7.00.

Short Courses consisting of 7 nights:

Short Courses will consist of 7 two-hour lessons commencing October 17 and 18 at 8 p.m. and ending November 28 and 29. Basic fee for the short course is \$4.00.

\$2.00 must be forwarded with the application form and the balance paid at the first lesson attended. Students who wish to take two courses will send two application forms, one for each, and will forward a total of \$4.00.

Square Dancing (Wed.) Total Fee \$10.00 per couple, \$7.00 single.
Welding (Tues.) Total Fee \$20.00. (Further charge may be required.)

If an applicant is unable to attend a class for which he has registered, his initial fee of \$2.00 will be refunded if he notifies the application Secretary before October 13th.

In all instances students will pay for costs of materials, and the necessary tools.
Applicants must be 16 years of age or over. Day school pupils will be accepted only on recommendation of Principal J. L. Lambert.

Food, Cars Big Item Halton Family Budget

Statistics Show \$734 Per Family

This amount, which represented 29 per cent of all retail sales, was for food bought for home consumption. Not included was money spent for outside eating and drinking. Food buying in Halton county was equivalent to \$734 per local family, determined by dividing the total purchases by the number of households. Outlets for cars and other automotive equipment such as motorcycles, boats, batteries and tires, accounted for \$11,074,000. They garnered 16 per cent of the retail dollar.

Sturdy sales volumes were recorded by other retail lines as well, despite the sag during part of the year due to the recession. Department stores and variety shops selling general merchandise grossed \$3,570,000, which amounted to five per cent of the retail dollar locally. Sales in apparel shops, including those selling hats, shoes, underwear and other clothing, came to \$2,819,000, or four per cent. Home furnishings stores had a sales volume of \$1,808,000, equal to nearly three per cent.

But for the mood of caution that prevailed last year among consumers in most parts of Canada, retail trade would have been many millions bigger than it was.
