## Half Would, Half Wouldn't Highway Rezoning Vetoed

Creation of a C2 commercial zone on Gushp St. from Maple Ave. to Rexway was turned down by council Monday on a close 3-3 vote.

Commercial Interests Two councillors who favoured the plan refrained from voting because they have commercial interests in the area. Reeve Doug Sargent was absent. The vote split with Mayor Hyde, Deputy Reeve Elliott and Cr. Emmerson favouring C2 and Crs. Cass, Brown and Burke opposed. Crs. Barrager and Hunter did not vote.

The question was first introduced by a Barrager - Hunter motion to which Cr. Cass immediately voiced objection. Cr. Hunter said C1 allows only about 4 business establishments, while C2 adds about 20 more, plus allowing an owner to build on 50% of a lot instead of only 20%. "I've no use to grand in this," he added. Cr. Burke was concerned that a C2 area could be noisy and limited in loading area. Adjoining property owners on Prince Charles should have a say in rezoning too, he felt. The mayor said this would be done as procedure would be for the planning board to recommend a change to council which would then seek Municipal Board approval. The board would call a public meeting for objections when this occurred.
