**Acton Reeve Thinks Hospital Cost High**

**Pension Plan Now for County Staff**

"For an addition, it seems too much money", was the opinion expressed by Reeve R. J. Hargrave of Acton, during a discussion on hospital grants, at County Council meeting this week. The comment arose out of a request by Oakville-Trafalgar Hospital for a grant of \$6,000 per bed for a proposed extension. Feeling this amount was too high, Mr. Hargrave went on to ask for a study of the county hospital grants.

Reeve F. Tilley, of Oakville, replied — "I agree that it would be desirable to have a statement showing the county Hospital indebtedness to date. However, he continued, "I feel it would be unfair to stop them now." Mr. Tilley felt that the Hospital Board has applied under the law, which stipulates \$6,000 per bed county grant, and until the by-law is amended county council has to abide by it. "Is an addition any different from new construction?" wondered Warden Phillips. Reeve Hargrave felt there was a difference. "The services, such as kitchens, laundries, etc. do not have to be rebuilt", he maintained "thus keeping the cost lower" Reeve Tilley pointed out that this held true only if the services had been planned at least as large as originally necessary.

Reeve I. Ryckman of Burlington suggested that in the event of a study being made, the finance committees of the various hospital boards should be allowed to present briefs, or at least be asked to attend joint meetings.

A pension plan for Halton County employees was adopted this month, after a favourable vote of the majority of the employees. The plan, proposed by the Standard Life Assurance Co. is not obligatory for present em-

ployees, but is obligatory for any new employees hired after October 1st.

An added feature is the inclusion, if desired, of employees of any municipality within the county, provided their own municipality has no such scheme.

Fall-out shelters are coming to Trafalgar Township, so Emergency Measures Co-ordinator McGregor informed county council. In the 'Greenacres' subdivision, developed by Mr. J. Kleinstein, either fallout shelters will be erected in the basement of the homes, or a communal shelter will be built for the area residents.

Mr. McGregor also told the Emergency Measures Committee that the Provincial and Federal Governments approval has been given to the Mutual Aid Radio Project for the county. When installed, all Halton county Fire Depts. will be linked by radio.

Halton county council endorsed a Wellington county resolution recommending that basement fall out shelters be exempt from taxation.

With a few appointments still to be made, the Halton county Museum Board at present consists of H. Merry and W. Bird, county council appointees, Ralph Wakeley, Oakville representative; Ben Case, Esquesing, John Milne, Nassagaweya; Mrs. David Dills, Acton and Walter Reeves, Burlington.
