This is the time of the year when hunters decide where the hunting boundaries will be next for next year or help the farmers decide how many 'No Trespassing' signs he'll need next year, when again, hunting season rolls

But if we treat the farmer and his property as we would have him treat ours, who knows? Maybe next year we can hunt in our own county, as the deer in Halton county are plentiful and should be hunted to save

them from the slow death of starvation, which is their west enemy, in an area such as Halton county, where there isn't ough food for all.

Athough deer season doesn't open until Nov. 6th in our area, we can start now, being goodwill ambassadors, during duck and pheasant seasons which open soon.

Trap shooting starts again this Sunday at the Georgetown 293 Anglers and Hunters Association Club on the 23rd sideroad at Hickory Falls.

A monster shoot will be held on Oct. 14th at the GASHA 195 club property for .22 rifles and shotgun 12-gauge.

Some of you may think our hunter training course is for the birds. If you are one of these, have a look at the regulations that face a young German hunter.

Minimum age to qualify for a hunting licence is 18 and the 269 young hunter must successfully complete a six months course on hunting laws, customs, study and identification of game and nongame species, and some fundamentals of game management. 220 Completing this, the new hunter is examined by a board of qual-210 ified German jaegers (hunters). If he passes his test, the young 200 hunter is entitled to purchase his license - 50 marks (\$12) but 142 (\$35,000 personal liability, \$35,000 property liability).
