Devereaux and that for the three of a kind to Miss Elsie Bird on roses.

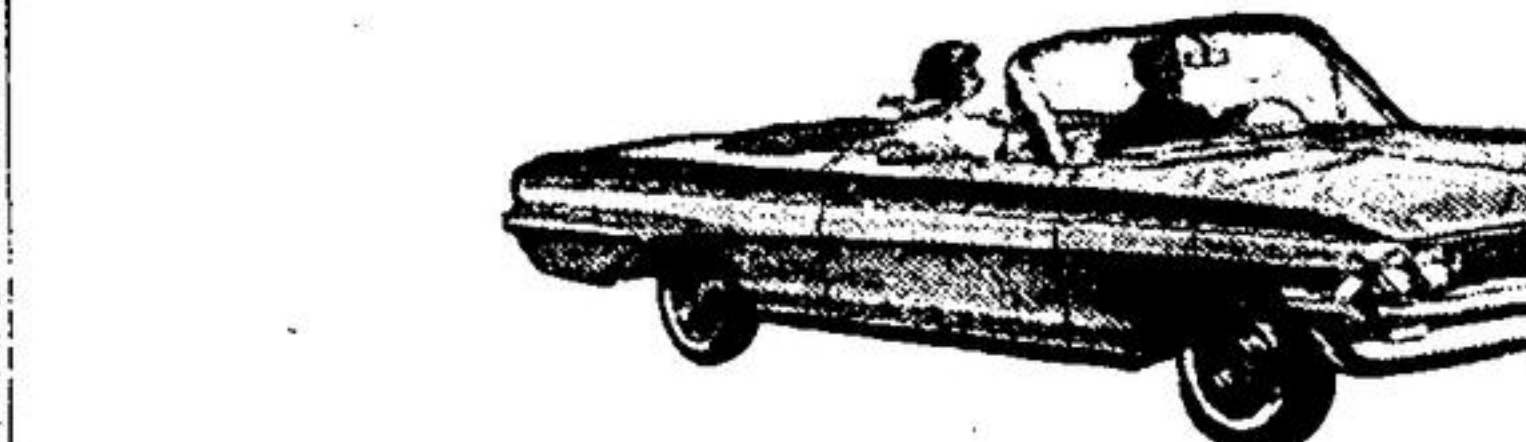
