



## Welfare Minister Speaks Manor Addition Dedication

**Kingsize Checkerboard Interesting Feature**

When Hon. Louis Cecile, Minister of Welfare, cut the ribbon opening the addition to Helton Centennial Manor last week, the Manor attained its ultimate size, a 235 bed capacity.

In addition to bed space, a library, auditorium, chapel, barber shop and beauty salon are now provided for the comfort of the residents, many of whom are unable to leave the Manor. A long-awaited feature is the accommodation for married couples.

Not to be outdone by Vancouver's Stanley Park, outdoor checkers is played on kingsize boards painted on the ground, with king sized checkers.

Acting as chairman for the opening ceremonies was Reeve Doug Sargent, who is chairman of the Manor Board. Warden Alex Phillips welcomed Mr. Cecile and expressed County Council's pleasure in providing such accommodation for the residents of Helton.

Mr. Len Shore, architect, listed some unusual features that the audience should watch for on the tour of the building. He cited the bed care unit in the central core of the building, with all the necessary services nearby; the homelike decorating colours, and the common room where residents can entertain their guests.

After a brief introduction by Mr. Stanley Hall, MPP for Halton, Mr. Cecile remarked, "It's obvious that Halton County is one of the best places in which to grow old." He contrasted the attitude of even ten years ago when House of Refuge was the common title, with the attitude reflected in "Homes for the Aged."

**Not Hospitals**

"They are neither hospitals nor hostels for indigents," he declared. "There is nothing of the poor house attitude," he went on. "Four out of five residents contribute substantially to their support." Other services for the aged were explained by the Minister. Old Age Assistance, free medical care, and free insurance.

Since 1949, the Province has matched the municipalities dollar for dollar in the Welfare field," the Minister maintained. Mr. Cecile concluded by emphasizing the fact that these benefits are provided in recognition of the long life of contribution to the community, and are a right rather than a hand-out.

The dedication was performed by the Revs. J. McGowan, M. Christensen, J. L. Graham, and D. A. Powell. Others who took part in the ceremony were Briz, A. F. Park, of the Salvation Army, head, Hamilton; Ronald Clark, President of the Ontario Ass'n. for the Aged, Mr. J. E. L. O'Neil, and Sandy Best, M.P. for Halton.

## Funeral Saturday For Baker, Postal Worker

Once proprietor of a local bake shop and later an employee of Brampton Post Office, John Frederick Baird, 63, died in Toronto General Hospital on September 21st.

Born in Palmerston, he was the son of Albert Henry Baird and Charlotte Jane Bessey. He attended public and high school there, was employed with Canadian National Railways until 1930 and then had a bake shop in Palmerston until he moved to Georgetown in 1944, which was the home town of his parents. His bake shop here was in the present Boughton Jewellers premises. After selling his business in 1947 he moved to Brampton where he was employed in the post office until 1958.

Mr. and Mrs. Baird came back to Georgetown the following year, purchasing the J. B. Mackenzie home on Mill Street. He had attended the United and Presbyterian churches.

He leaves his wife, Lillie Lewis, whom he married in Clifford in 1919; three children, Mrs. John Dalby (Ann) of Don Mills, Mrs. William Clark (Helen) of Georgetown and Jack of Toronto; a sister Mrs. D. A. Bennett (Beatrice) of Stratford; and grandchildren Peter, Paul and Philip Clark and Nancy Baird.

Rev. Alex Calder of Peterborough returned to town to conduct the funeral service on Saturday at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Harold and Bert McNeil, Stratford; Ted Whitehead, Hamilton; Ronald Clark, Brampton; Jack Hooper, Burlington and Lloyd Arthurs, Hamilton. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

## WHAT COUNCIL DID Planning Board Concerned Over Zoning Violations

A letter to council from Georgetown Planning Board has expressed concern over "repeated violations of the zoning by-law" and mentioned a car sales lot at the Edward St. - Highway corner as one of the offenders.

"The letter expresses a view, I suggest it be filed," said Mayor Hyde after it was read to council Monday.

Cr. Ian Cass argued that his planning committee should discuss the letter.

"I was at the board meeting when the letter originated and the board is concerned about its position. Some members felt the board achieves very little if council is only going to enforce zoning when it wants to," he said.

**Not Permitted**

Asked by Cr. Burke what position had been taken when a building permit was issued, a letter was produced in which the town engineer had advised the firm that the property is zoned C1 and a car sales showroom is not permitted.

"This is a continuing use, even though a non-conforming one," said Mayor Hyde. "The property has been a sales lot and service station for some time."

The mayor asked for a show of hands on whether the planning committee should deal further with the letter, and a majority approved this.

## East Ratepayers Protest Want Two Voting Wards

The East Georgetown Ratepayers Association decided last week to protest the division of wards. They feel their area is too large for one ward, and should be divided into two. The protest will be passed on to council.

A nominating committee was set up to assess the would-be candidates for Council, from the area. The Committee's job will be to decide which candidates receive the Association's backing.
