An industrial story which has kept our community on tenterhooks for months has materialized with announcement by the American-Marietta Company that contracts have been awarded for a new plant in. Georgetown.

The firm, with Itead office in Chicago, optioned an acreage in Delrex last spring, and since then had been renewing its option each month, while not definitely stating its intentions.

In Georgetown, sealants, insulation and caulking compounds and other industrial chemical products will be produced. It will operate under the Presstite division of American-Marietta, which supplies products for the automotive industry.
