Nassagaweya Township Votes "Wet" Majority

End 55 Year Dry Spell, Record Vote

'Dry' since 1906, 1,043 Nassagaweya Township voters went to the polls Saturday, Sept. 23rd, to approve legal liquor outlets by an overwhelming 74.4 majority. With the vote, they approved a \$3,500,000 night harness racing track that was promised if they could legalize drinking outlets in the township.

The vote set a new record 81.3 per cent turnout for Nassagaweya. The question on beer for men, beer-for-men and women, beer and wine with meals, dining lounge and liquor lounge passed by 70.4 to 74.4 per cent majorities. They needed a 60 per cent yes vote to be carried.

The 1,043 voters cast a total of 5,312 ballots, of which 110 were spoiled, township clerk and returning officer Don McMillan reported. Voting was heavy that the final totals were Nassagaweya was on New Year's day, 1906, when voters passed, although endorsed local option by a 171 majority. The vote that year Deputy returning officers re-ported a flood of voters early in the day, but toward evening nearly everyone had cast their ballots and the rush subsided. W. Von Richthofen, one of the promoters of the track and a township horse breeder, expressed his thanks to the Vote Yes organizers at a party held to celebrate the victory. He said the voters could be sure on Saturday.

Local option was carried in Oakville, Nelson and Trafalgar as well as Nassagaweya that year. It was defeated in Acton. Here is how the vote went:

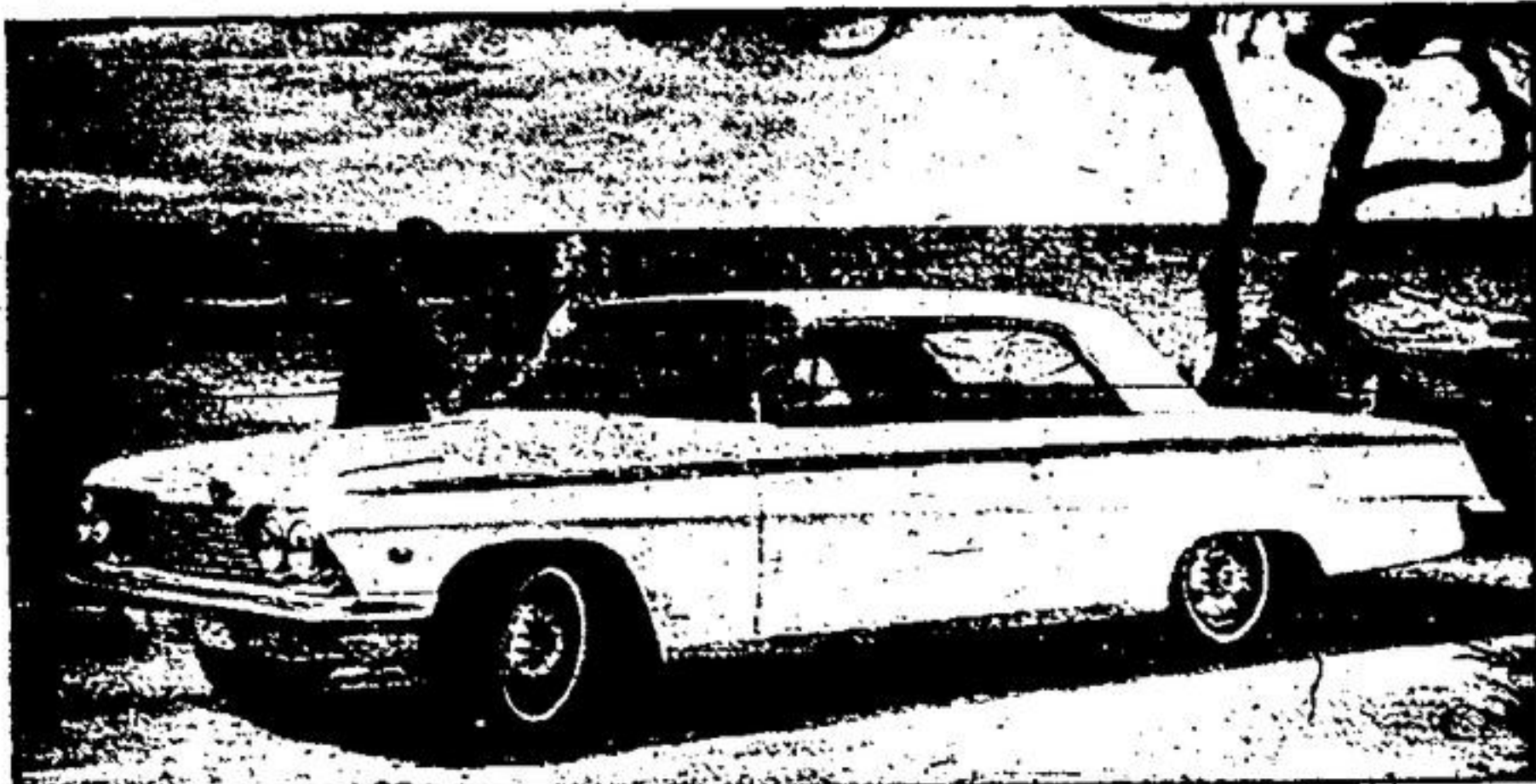

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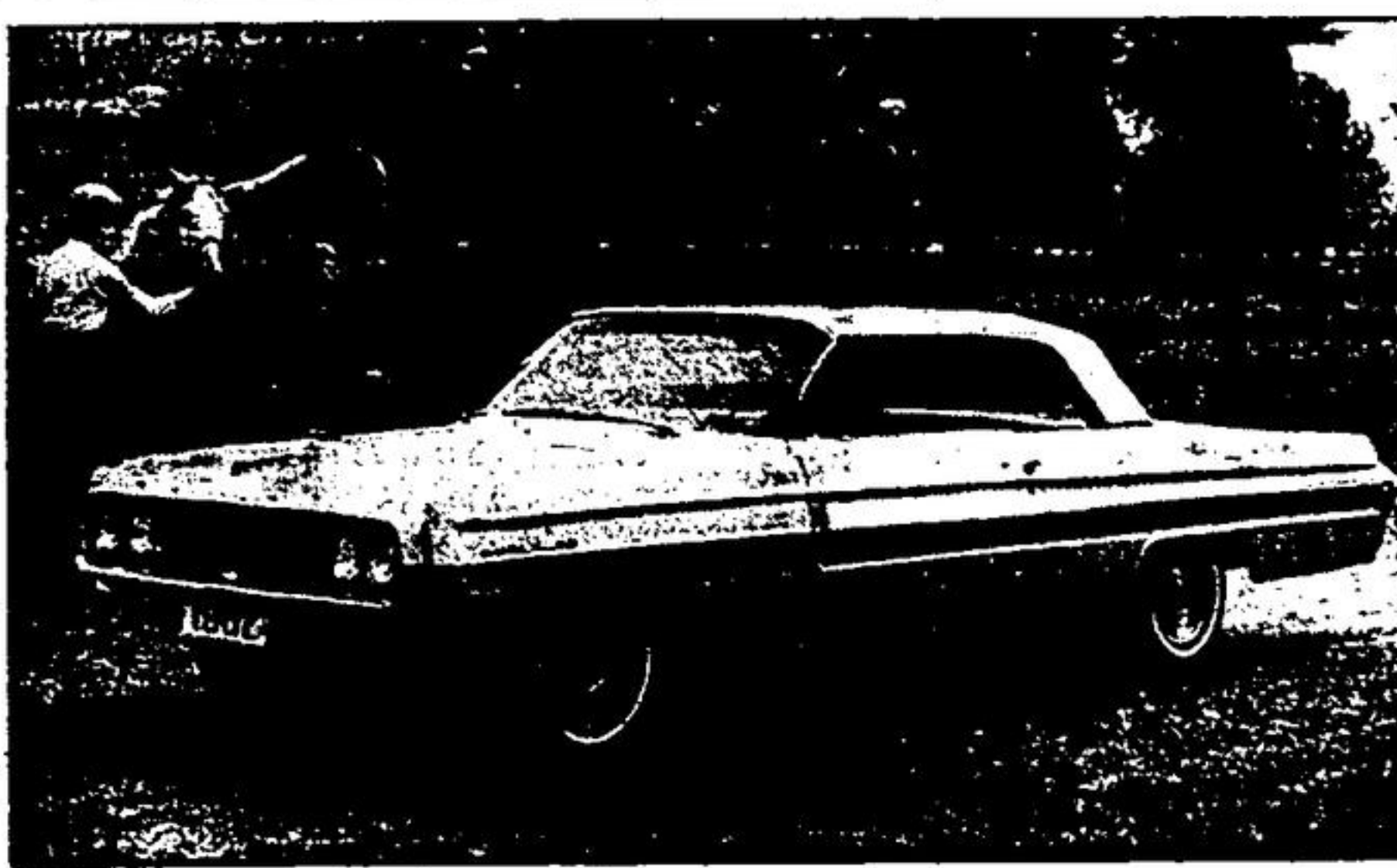
1962 CHEVROLET

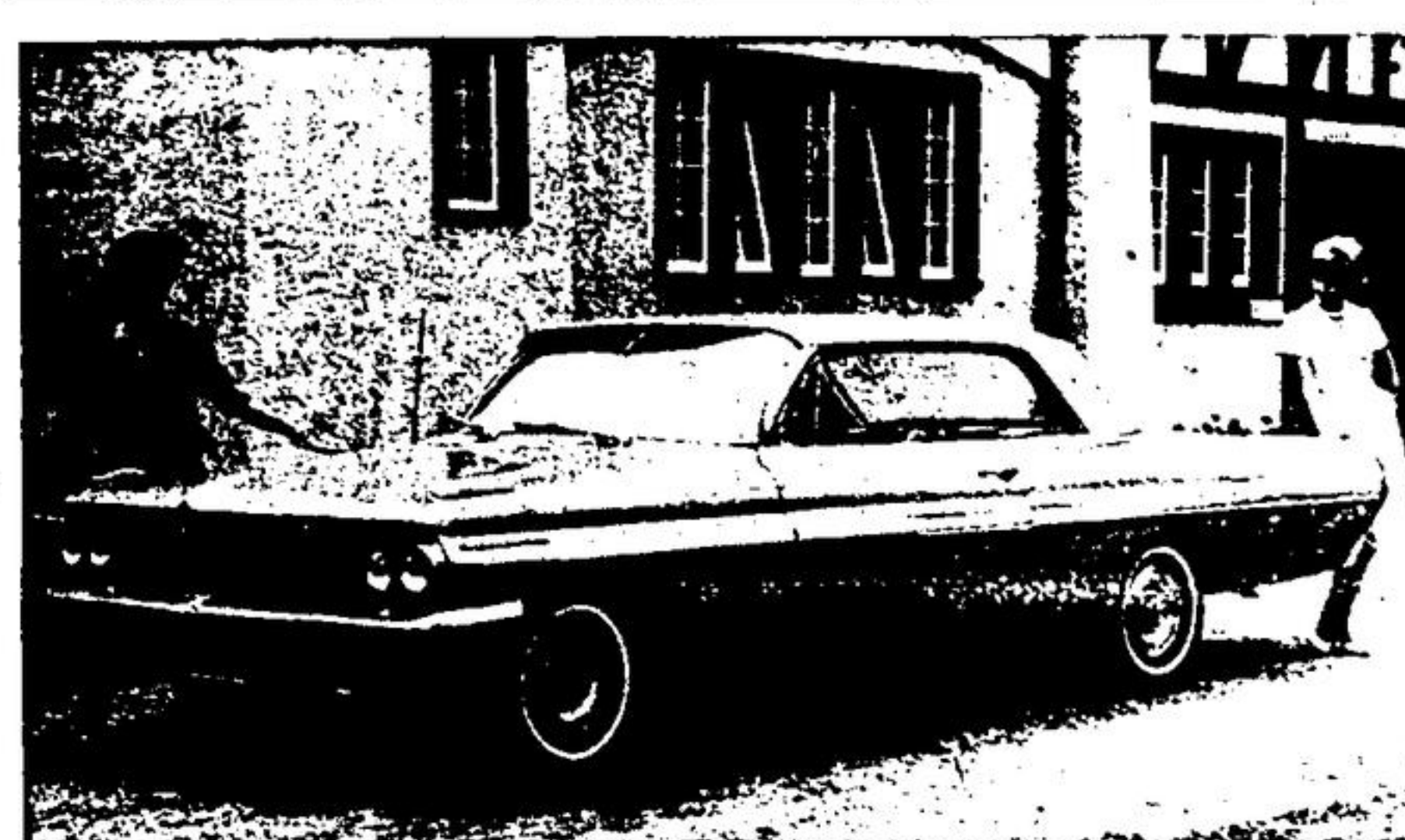
1962 CHEVY II

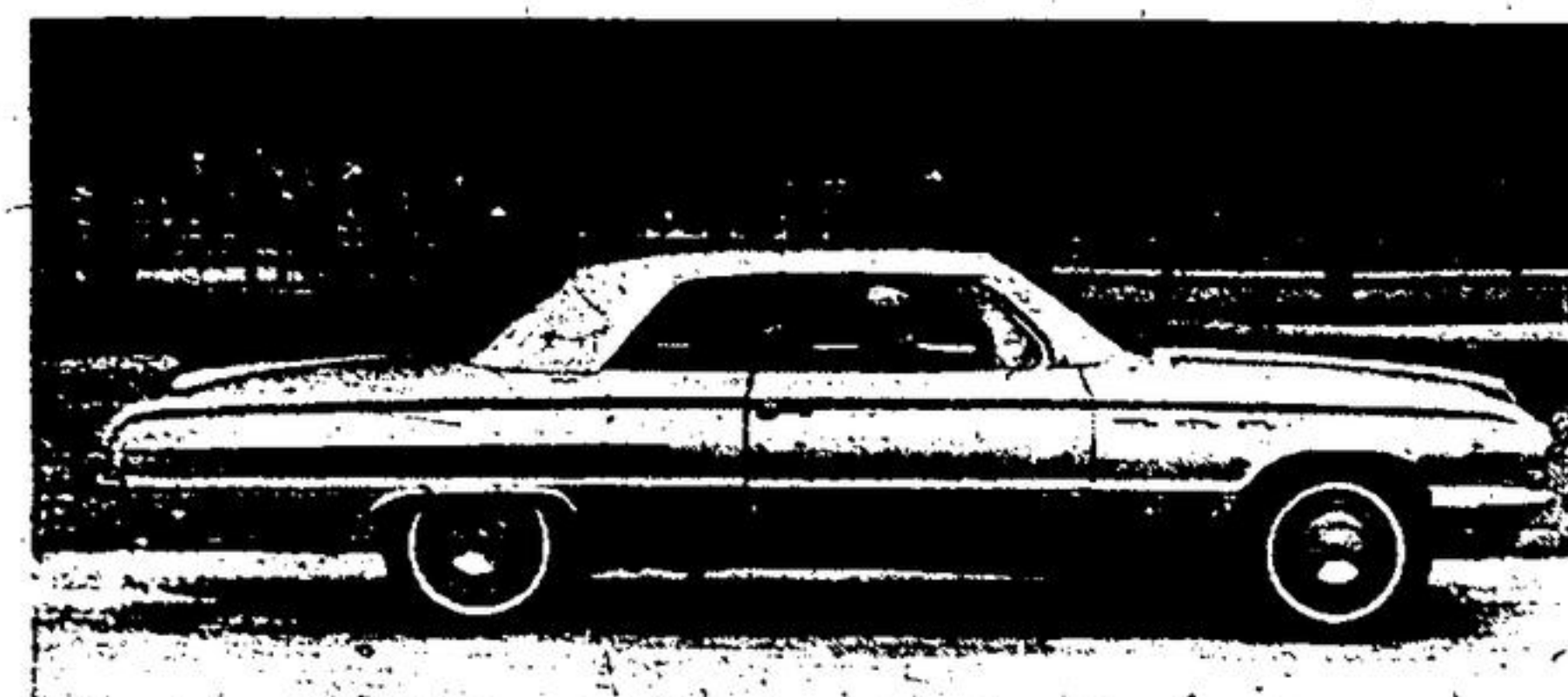
1962 OLDSMOBILE
