Clark Injured Prior To Grand Prix Race

"I heard the ambulance siren wailing, but thought nothing about it, till Grant didn't come around the track past where I was standing," were the words of Mrs. G. Clark, wife of the local racing car driver, describing her husband's accident at Mosport on Saturday.

"Then the sickening realization hit me, it was Grant. I ran over to the first aid tent, and there he was—a gory mess."

May Need Skin Graft

While looking a mess, he isn't seriously injured. One side of his face, his shoulder, and one hand, are all badly scraped, and brush-burned, but his knee has a deep gouge out of it, which may require skin grafting.

"Without the roll bar, and seat belt, he'd have been a goner for sure," said Terry Clark.

It seems the spokes in the wheel of the Austin Healey collapsed, making the car lurch on to the gravel, then it shot through the rail and flipped over three times.

His forced absence left a big hole in the Canadian Comstock team in the Canadian Grand Prix later the same afternoon. Team mate Peter Ryan, however, rose to the occasion and captured the title after fighting off Ricardo Rodriguez and Sterling Moss.

Night in Hospital

Grant spent the night in Bowmanville hospital, and his wife Terry, brought him home Sunday. The accident happened during the second lap of the Production Sports Car Race.

Luckily, Grant was not planning to take part in any races until December, when he will race at Nassau, in the Bahamas. Is Mrs. Clark going? Yes, you can count on that.

SPECIAL ESOX MASQUINONGY IMMACULATUS RECIPE

Take a rod from a whirl-way spinner, add a chunk of Luxor reel, mix with a bait rod handle and season with an 8 lb. test nylon line (use only line that has been aged 6 years or more) now top off with a mirror-minnow.
