### Acid Ignites, Causes Blaze in Truck Trailer

The combination of hydrochloric acid and galvanized metal generated enough heat to cause a fire in a Scobies trailer parked behind the Alliance Mill last Thursday.

According to Fire Chief Bob Bonfield, the trailer containing mixed freight had been left there after coming from Toronto earlier the same morning. Apparently a container of hydrochloric acid had developed a leak enroute and when it touched the galvanized ware, ignited the inside of the trailer.

Men working at the mill spotted smoke seeping from the trailer and when they lifted the tarp to make an inspection it burst into flames. The men doubled the blaze before it could be held the latter part of November.

Chief Bonfield, called in to

make an investigation, said the floor of the trailer was completely saturated with the acid and had to be hosed down.
