### Land Release Hassle Leads To New Decision

The Georgetown Public School Board is being forced by circumstances to add classrooms at one school though another could use them better, and council to find out if the idea is workable.

how would they be supervised will be thrashed out when trustees Roy Hansen and Don Pow- ers meet with the letter writers and council to find out if the idea is workable.

A pre-school survey indicates that the George Kennedy School will need more space next term but just what is to be included in the proposed addition is the board's dilemma.

The system devised so that school principals file regular reports on teachers in their individual schools who are new to the profession may go into effect this month.

The Department of Education stipulates that new classrooms should be added in blocks of four and the board must be able to convince council that the requirement is there.

Four more rooms on Kennedy would also overtax the present washroom facilities and would mean more washrooms.

Two letters requesting skating and hockey facilities at Harrison and Kennedy public schools, one from the Harrison Home and School Association and the other from five householders, brought action from the board.

The letters were almost identical in their suggestions that the hockey cushions and skating rinks be created on the school grounds to provide winter recreation.

Request from a Bible Club to meet Tuesdays at Harrison Public School was granted but they will be required to use a corridor instead of the asked for classroom.

The Wrigglesworth fire late last term will cost the school board about \$10,000. Accounts for September totalled \$8,822.76 current and \$1,077.70 debt.

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## Riviera Dance Hall Building at Norval

A fabulous Japanese-styled modern dance hall, opening early in December, is being erected on the bank of the Credit River in Norval.

The 'Riviera', as it will be called, sits on four wooded acres overlooking the river. The building is a breathtaking octagon of glass, with a modified pagoda type roof, and a huge dome in the centre.

From the tables, a commanding view of the winding river, arched by weeping willows is obtained through a forty three foot wall of glass.

In the summertime there will be dancing under the trees on a large patio, with lighting provided by floodlights hidden in the base of the trees.

Six hundred people can be accommodated in the spacious hall, where name bands will play on the clam-shaped bandstand each Saturday.

A buffet will be served at the dances, and a dinner dance may be inaugurated after a while.

Tentative plans call for square dancing Wednesday night, and round dancing Fridays. The possibility of Sunday Amateur night is also being discussed.

Two acres have been set aside for parking. To reach the parking lot you drive under the sloping canopy, where passen-

gers can be discharged, then on into the parking lot.

Driving across the bridge on Highway 7 at Norval, many a curious stare will be directed toward the brilliantly lit spot nestling on the river bank.

The backers, the Riviera Corporation, an investment group, feel that the situation halfway between Brampton and Georgetown, and the uniquely beautiful site, will serve to keep the crowds coming back.

The faintly oriental design was created, naturally enough by a Chinese, Mr. John Ma, and the decor will be carried out by a Japanese, Mr. David Kobayashi.

Plans for a gala opening, possibly Dec. 2nd, are already being made, and New Year's Eve promises to be an outstanding event.

The building is being constructed by Zuber Homes Ltd.

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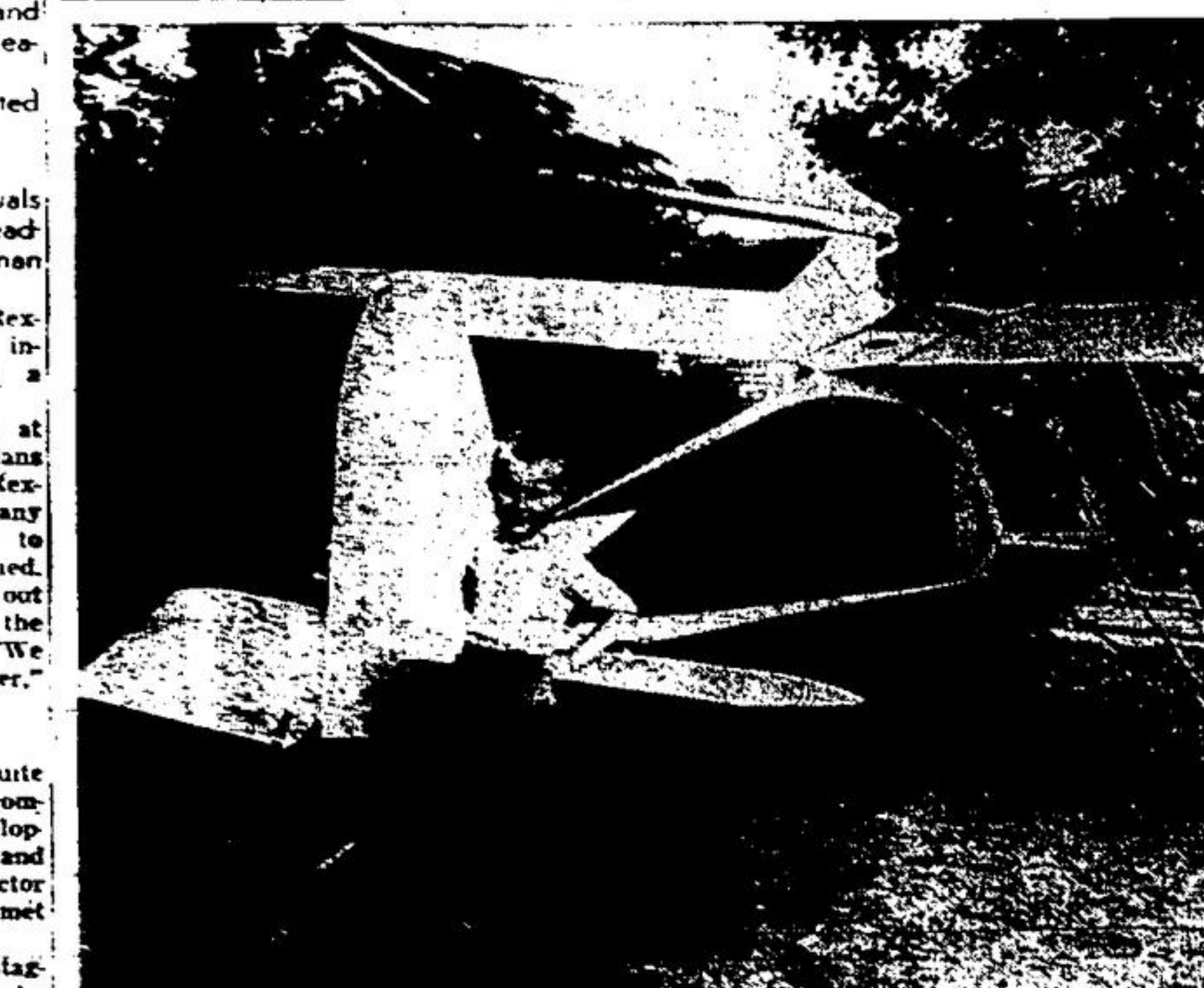
