Are Parking Meters Pennies Nickels Legal Tender Here?

Are the 'pennies' and 'nickels' and 'dimes' called for on Georgetown's parking meters legal tender? In Nanaimo, B.C., they aren't considered legal — at least not for the time being. Recently an overtime parking charge was thrown out of court by the novel defence which could have wide-spread repercussions. Meters in both Georgetown and Nanaimo have signs indicating the time pennies, nickels and dimes will give. In the Nanaimo case Clifford Williams contended and Magistrate Lionel Beaver-Potts agreed that 'pennies' and 'nickels' are not legal tender. Yet, he said, those were the terms used on Nanaimo's parking meters. RCMP tagged Williams' car for overtime parking July 14th beside a meter reading: "12 minutes for each penny — 60 minutes for one nickel. Williams produced in court an English penny — much too large to go into any meter. Defence 'Novel' Magistrate Beaver-Potts termed Williams' defence 'novel' and called a half hour adjournment while court officials read a law on the subject and police
