Truck, Three Cars In Highway Accident

Minor injuries and property damage amounting to an estimated \$1,200 resulted when the brakes on a Peel Construction International dump truck failed at the Guelph and Queen St. corner last Wednesday.

The accident involved four vehicles, a 1954 Chevy driven by Norm Lowrey of 77 Mountaineer Rd., a 1953 Mercury driven by Paul Hodge, R.R. 2, Georgetown, a 1958 Chevy driven by Dorothy Margaret Cook of R.R. 4, Georgetown, and the 1961 International dump truck driven by Donald Joseph Keys of Brant County.

The truck was eastbound on the highway and approaching two standing cars, Lowrey and Cook, when the brakes failed. The driver told the police he couldn't steer right because of children on the sidewalk and the westbound car being driven by Hodge made it impossible to go into the opposite lane. The truck bounced the second car into the first wheel, dented into Hodge's car.

The Cook car, which bore the brunt of the damage, contained all the injuries. Mrs. Cook suffered bruises and an injured left ankle. Billy Cook, age 14, suffered a back injury and Robert, age 6, received bruises and a cut over his right eye.

The truck was carrying a full load of gravel at the time of the accident. Sgt. Ron Rankine made the investigation.
