last week with the annual meeting and election of officers on Monday evening. Douglas Latimer is past-president and also chairman of Education; Reg Broomhead, President; Terry Salnes, vice president; treasurer Don Powers; secretary, Mrs. John Elliott; Women's Service, Mrs. R. F. Wicks and Mrs. Alison Bradley, publicity. The Campaign Chairman will be elected at a later date.

The November meeting of the North Halton Unit will be held in Georgetown and plans to make this an excellent meeting were discussed. A film "The Woven Thread" on the work of the Cancer Society in Canada was shown. The fact was stressed that these Cancer films are not repulsive as one would first think, they educate people into early diagnosis of this disease which can be cured in many instances. It was stressed that after seeing one of these films which are available to any organization for their meetings, that the great fear is gone and a sensible attitude to the problem is attained. There are of course a few films on Cancer that are made for the use of Doctors and Nurses only, which deal with later stages of the disease where people have not been receptive to the wealth of education available to them. Former Principal is New Presbyterian Church Moderator

Nephew of Mrs. Robert Waldie, 12 McNabb Street, Rev. John R. Waldie of Port Hope was elected moderator of the Presbyterian Church Synod of Toronto and Kingston at the opening of its 87th annual meeting at Rogers Memorial Church, Toronto last week.

He was elected on the first ballot over Rev. Alex McLean of Willowdale and Rev. J. Leonard Self of Midland. Three other ministers were nominated but withdrew.

Mr. Waldie, who was installed in office by retiring moderator Rev. John F. Cote of Orangeville, was called to St. Paul's Church, Port Hope, 2 1/2 years ago after a lengthy ministry in London, Ontario.

Born on a farm near Acton, he taught school for four years before entering Queen's University where he took a Master of Arts degree with Canadian church history as his major thesis. He graduated from Knox College in 1932. At one time he was principal of Chapel Street Public School.

Mr. Waldie is the first synod moderator from the Peterborough presbytery in 25 years. While in London in 1948, he was elected moderator of the synod of Hamilton and London. He is a son of Mrs. Donald Waldie of Acton, now of Guelph and brother of Alex Waldie of Acton.
