Georgetown's B & P's Among 506 At Conference in Hamilton

Georgetown Business & Professional Women's Club was represented at the 16th Annual Provincial Conference in Hamilton by Mrs. Barry Timleck as the delegate, Mrs. J. Rundle as observer and Mrs. Aileen Bradley as regional adviser for District No. 4. Mrs. Timleck and Mrs. Bradley received a prize as a mother and daughter combination at the conference which had a registration of 506 members.

New officers were elected on Saturday by the representatives of 82 of the 84 Business & Professional Women's Clubs of Ontario who were in attendance at the convention.

Mrs. Edward H. Ashdown of Toronto is Ontario president for 1961-1964. Miss Joan Wilson of Guelph, Miss Constance McKittick of Welland, Miss Dorothy Milligan of Ottawa, Miss Edna Sumbler of New Liskeard, are provincial district vice-presidents. Mrs. Norman Brown of Belleville is honorary treasurer.

The business of the convention was begun on Saturday morning, with a speech by Mrs. Glen Gibson of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario president and presiding officer at the convention.

Mrs. Gibson reported that, as part of the work accomplished in 1960, seven briefs were presented by the organization to the provincial government.

The briefs concerned amendments to the Succession Duty Act, penal reform for women and juveniles, the Ontario Hospital Services Commission, the Ontario Jurors Act, extension of the municipal franchise, air pollution, and the Ontario anti-discrimination commission.

P.M. Sends Message
Women who are gainfully employed in many branches of work will be invited to "Open House" gatherings sponsored by individual clubs across Canada.

Church parades and other special events have been planned to focus attention on the working woman. Theme of the week is "More Power with Woman Power."

In a letter to launch Business Women's Week, Prime Minister Diefenbaker said "The Federation has been a powerful force in the campaign to remove discrimination against women in business and professions and contributed much to the enactment of the Bill of Rights, which specifically provides that there will be no discrimination because of sex."

Concern was expressed at the business session with the form of the draft bill on portable pensions. The Ontario clubs are considering recommendations to urge that the mandatory minimum of 15 employees be changed.

She said that in the last ten years "the percentage of workers occupied in the service producing industries has increased to 52 per cent." Because of jobs such as these which "women are trained to do" and men are not, she asserted that "There has been no difficulty absorbing the increased number of working women properly qualified."

"I do not think anyone in this country, male or female, who wishes to work should be denied the opportunity of seeking a job, no matter what their economic circumstances may be. The right to work should surely be considered as one of the basic freedoms enjoyed by every Canadian."

The Hon. Ellen Fairclough, Minister of Citizenship and Immigration and a member of the Hamilton Club spoke at the Sunday luncheon on what might be done in individual communities to mark Canada's 100th birthday in 1967. She stated that the Canadian Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs were one of the 125 non-governmental organizations represented on the Canadian Centenary Council.

Register 10 Convictions As Court Docket Slumps

Ten convictions were registered in the local court on Monday, October 16th when just 20 cases came before Magistrate Kenneth M. Langdon. Under the Highway Traffic Act upheld 6 charges while a 7th was remanded to a future court. Three were convicted, 1 dismissed and 1 remanded in 5 Criminal Code actions, and in 4 Liquor Control Act cases, 1 conviction was made and the others were remanded. Four Liquor License Act cases were dismissed. The next Georgetown court will be held November 6th.
