Persons who are seeking work in the hospital are asked to make a personal call at which time a formal application will be taken by Mrs. V. Lay, secretary to the Administrator.

This application will remain on file for selection purposes for 30 DAYS ONLY and then be discarded unless it had been renewed within that time. The reason for this method is that hospital jobs are not expected to turn over at any rapid rate. We cannot maintain a long term file or promise preference based on time of application. Neither should an application for employment be taken as assurance of selection.

LAST TIME...

Rebels 1961 Football Lords Humble Milton Again, 8 - 6

Georgetown High School will bow out of the historic north Halton high school football conference covered with great goals of glory this season.

Wednesday the GHS Rebels, on the passing arm of quarterback Jim McGill and the educated foot of punter John Pencock, foiled Milton 8 to 6 to clinch the loop title in their farewell year. Next term the school's enrollment will force them into a higher sports bracket.

All the Way. While on anatomy Denny Martell's hands have to come in for mention here. Martell at left end, completely fooled the Milton secondary on the only GHS major score when he darted into the left flank after the Milton pass umbrella had been pulled right by the other potential receivers.

Shadowed only by a corner-backer, Martell got two steps behind him and then, made a half turn to his left just as McGill's toss hit him perfectly. There was nobody between him and the goal line.

The play started on the GHS 45 yard line and 65 yards, 15 in the air and the rest on the ground.

Ironically the big pass play and the only other consistent gainer, a reverse, which picked up 100 of the 80 yds. Georgetown picked up rushing, were introduced into the offense just two nights before the game.

Milton Lead. Milton had taken a 60 lead when Don Curry went over for the touchdown in the first quarter from 4 yards out. But it was the pinpoint bombing of John Pencock that made the difference. Pencock punted twice into the wind for single points and both times the ball landed in the end zone and then bounced out of bounds giving the deep men no chance to run it up.

Later in the game Dave McLeod, the fastest man on the team ran around the left end for 70 yards before being knocked into touch at the Milton five yard line by Curry, but the Georgetown attack stalled there. On six tries from inside the ten yard line they could only manage to get to the one.

Milton played great defensive ball but the locals were just as solid when they had to be.
