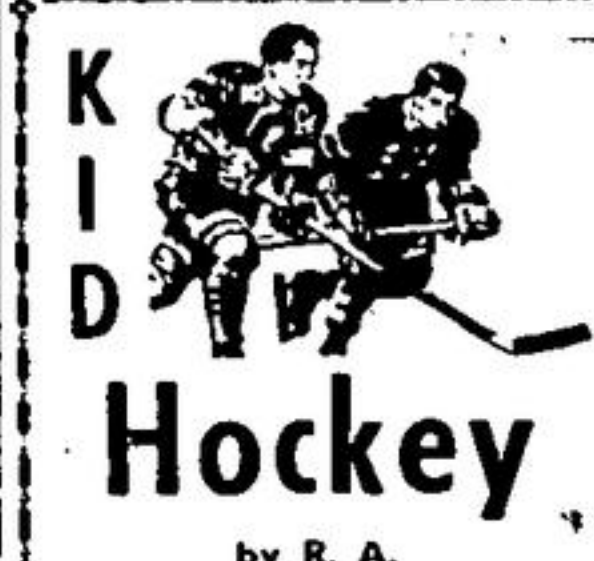

#### Silence Inferred Veto of Open Committee Meetings

A proposition of council committee meetings being open to the public, Alex Marshment was told by Mayor Hyde at Monday's council meeting that he has already been given a clear answer.

Mr. Marshment complained that statements are coming out of council meetings "half-said," leaving townspeople in a dither.

"I would like to hear our East Georgetown councillors tell us why we haven't an up-to-date answer," he said.

Mayor Hyde said a great deal has been accomplished in committee meetings, which couldn't have been done at an open meeting.

"If committee meetings were open there would be the question of pay also," he pointed out.

"Unless a motion is presented for open meetings, you can infer that a majority of councillors prefer them closed," he said.

Both Don Powers and myself hope that, sometime, in the not too distant future, that the Georgetown club can play host to this annual convention.

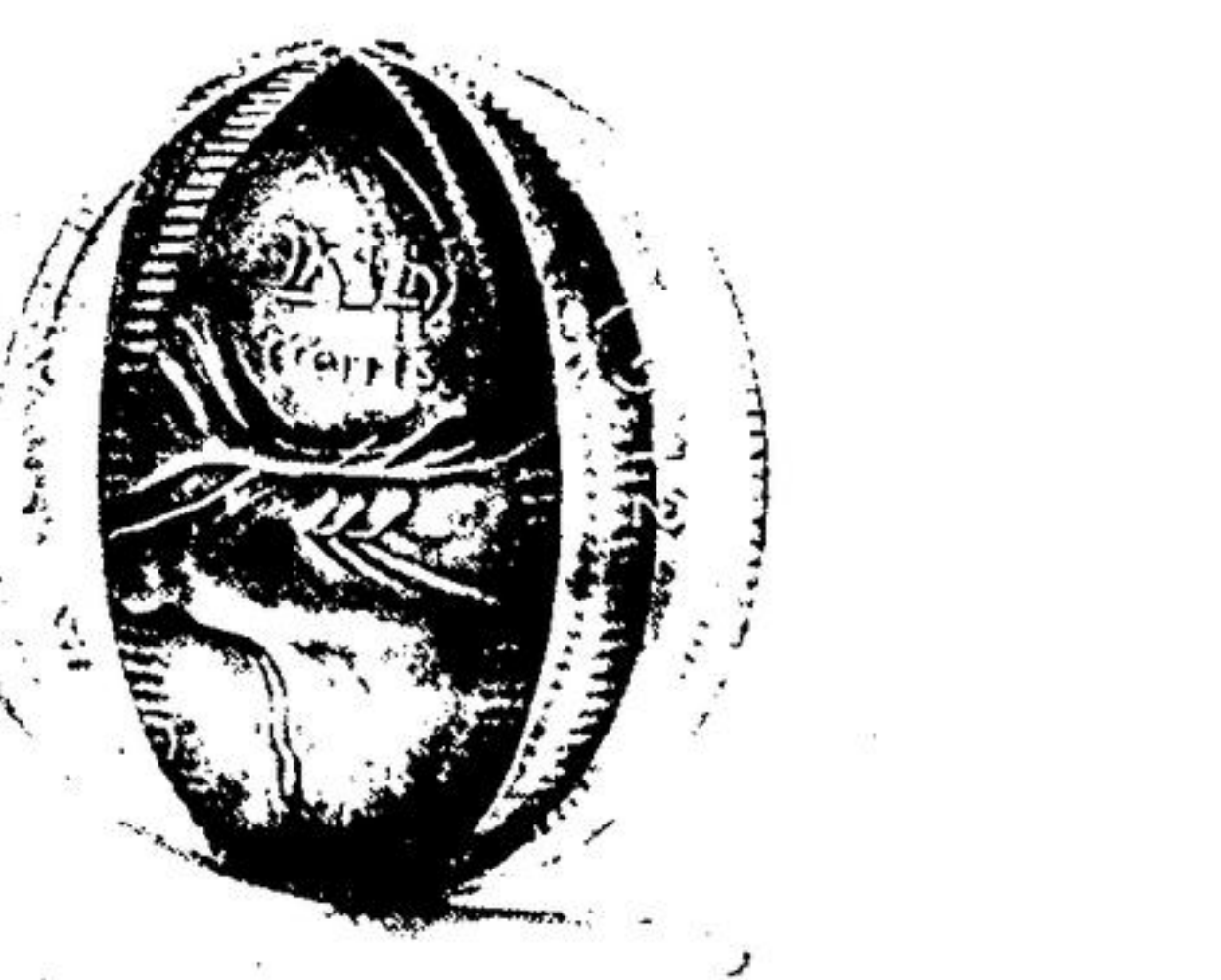
