

Mayor Urges Publicity For Tax Delinquents

But Councillors Mum on Opinion

Rumors of coming publicity for tax delinquents were apparent again Monday when Mayor Hyde told council it is not fair to publicize one back account while allowing a cloak of secrecy for others.

A tax bill owing by Delrex Developments has received much publicity lately when the town solicitor was advised to press for payment.

SCOUT CORNER



The following is a message from the President of the District Scout Council, Sam Melzer.

"I should like to draw attention to some facts about the Scout program.

The complete Group consists of a Wolf Cub Pack, and Boy Scout Troop and Rover Scout Crew, under the general supervision of a group committee. While provision is made for the fact that under special circumstances, there may be less than 3 sections in a group, this is not regarded as desirable.

We feel that not enough consideration has been given to the whole Scout programme and the ultimate objective, the production of a man. Each worker in Scouting should feel that he is contributing his part to the production of a man. He is not primarily concerned with serving a boy in his section.

Leaders will be preparing the boy to pass from Cubbing through Scouting and Rovering until he graduates as the finished product, the man. In this objective we join forces with the home, from church or synagogue and the 'school'.

The most important age at which we work with boys is the Scout age. It is between the years eleven and sixteen that character begins to set. Important though Cubbing is, the boys can still be influenced to change their ways when they leave the pack. It is essential therefore that we give our attention more fully to the filling of our existing Scout troops and the provision of additional troops to handle the boys coming up from the Cub packs which have no Troop associated with them.

Each Wolf Cub Pack should have a Scout troop. Nor should we be satisfied to confine our efforts to serving

graduating Cubs at the Troop level. 75 per cent of the eligible boy population is not reached by Cubbing during the years between 8 and 11. These boys should be given an invitation to join Scout troops. While a few drift into Scouting at Troop level, our old idea of actively recruiting boys for Scouting troops seem to have been lost and the troops are content to service the boys who come from the Packs and not concern themselves further.

We must urge our boys to invite a friend to attend their meetings.

I should like to thank all those in the district, who have been cooperating and working in the interest of Scouting in this district.
