Movies, Vocal Recital Entertain Manor Folk

The first "movie" night in the new fall and winter season of entertainment at the Manor was held in the auditorium on Friday evening, October 20th. Using the Manor's own projector, Mr. S. Allen, the Superior tent, showed three motion picture films, two of which were in colour and one in black and white.

The first film, "Railroaders" was in black and white and was an interesting description of the work done by the dispatchers and maintenance crews on the Canadian Pacific railway in the heart of the mountains in western Canada. The stretch of track chosen for this film was that on which the town of Revelstoke is situated.

The second film, "Ireland Land of Welcome", showed, in colour, the beauty spots of the Emerald Isle as seen from the windows of a motor coach on a tour arranged by Ireland's Transport Company. Starting at Dublin the coach made a complete circuit of Ireland, stopping at such famous beauty spots as Blarney Castle, where a tourist was shown kissing the Blarney Stone, Killarney, Galway Bay, the Hills of Donegal and several Irish counties.

The third film, "No Longer Vanishing", also in colour, showed the increasingly important part that the North American Indians are playing in Canadian life, particularly in the logging and construction industries for which they seem to be particularly adapted.

Photo Exhibition At Public Library

An interesting photographic exhibition is currently showing at the Public Library. "Early Ontario Architecture" has a twofold purpose - it is designed to show something of the character of the pioneer settlement in Ontario, and to make people aware that good architecture of the past is a heritage to be cherished. The area chosen to illustrate this is Niagara-on-the-Lake, a typical colonial town.

Pictured in the exhibit are the church, the town house, the shop, the blacksmith's, the tavern, the meetinghouse. The atmosphere of the early 19th century is suggested in the dramatic treatment of the doorways in the houses of that era - the graceful proportions of door, fan-light and side lights. Interior details include sweeping spiral stairways, cozy fireplaces and well proportioned arches.

Included in this exhibition and of local interest, are the Rockwood Academy near Acton and two farm homes in the Meadowdale district. U.E.L.'s will recognize the Barnum house at Grafton, fashioned after a style well known in Virginia and the eastern United States.

This is a charming exhibition depicting an unspoiled early Canadian architecture and is on view until November 17th.

Future exhibits at the Library include "Contemporary Canadian Paintings" early in December and the original panels of the O'Keefe Centre mural "The Seven Lively Arts" in January.
