OUTDOORS SPORTSMEN

A striking example of the rapid rate of growth possible in rainbow trout was illustrated by a fish taken recently by Cecil Kumagi, of Rexdale, Ont., while fishing in the Nottawasaga River.

The trout was taken Oct. 17th and at that time measured 14 1/2 inches. Cecil noticed that his trout wore a Dept. Tag No. 132500. And upon returning said tag to the Dept. he was informed that this particular fish was tagged at Silver Creek, near Col. Langwood, on June 5th, 1961. And at the time of tagging the fish measured 6 1/2 inches, representing a growth of 8 1/2 inches in four and a half months.

A biologist Allan Wainio, at the Maple Office, was able to confirm from comparing scale samples taken, both in the spring and at the time of capture, the phenomenal growth had actually occurred while the fish was in Lake Huron.

The above report also emphasizes the value of the scale samples supplied by anglers to the department. Both the scales and tags are of considerable use to the fish and wildlife when carrying out research programs on fish as well as other wildlife surveys.

If, for any reason, you cannot return these tags or wish to retain same, supplying the Dept. with the tag number will be satisfactory and of equal value.

Question: Do you need a pheasant licence to hunt ducks in Halton county?

Answer: Yes and no. Explanation: In counties such as Halton which are classed as pheasant season, you are required to have a groundhog licence as well as a duck licence during the groundhog season, and then during pheasant season you are required to hold a pheasant licence while hunting ducks in these game preserve counties.

I have had no reports of any deer being shot by local hunters except one party shot 5 deer and one bear in the first week of deer season, but as yet, I don't know who was in the party or where they were hunting.

All the local hunters must have forgotten about moose this year, as I haven't even heard a rumour about any being shot, by the way, three local hunters having been treed by a moose, maybe the hunted has turned hunter.
