The annual dinner was again a crowded affair, with some 220 guests sitting down to a turkey dinner in the Legion auditorium. The excellent dinner was prepared by members of the Verdun Rebekah Lodge.

The beginning of the evening saw a musical interlude played by John Toshier of the Debonnaires Orchestra. Following this, the gathering listened to the Queen and Grace was said by Padre Rev. Kenneth Richardson.

Twenty-five year past were then presented to a number of members, by President Dave Capperauld. Among those receiving their award were Harry Hale, Sid Cross, Ken Rogers, Harry Knobel, Tom Hunter and Harry Savin. President Capperauld thanked them for their services over the years.

As a further note of the Branch's esteem, a check for \$4,000 was presented to the Hospital Board by the president, Dave Capperauld, on behalf of the Legion for the \$2,000 which was presented last year.

He moved from a young man who had gone to war and had gone missing in an aircraft over the many. And he said that the Legion had been a great help to him in his search for his missing son.

Les Clark, a former member of the Board, presented a cheque for \$1,000 to the Hospital Board. He had been a member of the Board for many years and had been a member of the group God Speed and every success in the future. Mrs. Jim Emmerson presented a cheque to the branch for \$325 to help make up the pledge. She gave it on behalf of the group she heads the W.A. of the Legion. Thanks were expressed to her and the W.A. for this large gift.

"Our Fallen Comrades" was the traditional toast to our dead was proposed by master of ceremonies, Les Clark.
