Standard Firm Earns Profit in September

The Standard Products Company earned a profit in September in spite of production cut backs resulting from strikes in automobile plants, and operations for the six months ending next December 31 are expected to show an "encouraging profit trend," F. R. Valpey, president, said today in the quarterly report to shareholders.

While the automotive parts company's operations for the fiscal first quarter ending on September 30 are normally affected by low volume and high costs resulting from model changeovers in the automobile industry, the three-month loss this year was cut to \$104,159 or 14 cents a share this year, compared with \$270,042 or 35 cents a share for the same period a year ago.

Mr. Valpey said operations during October are proceeding on a profitable basis, with sales of over \$9,000,000 forecast for the current quarter.

"As a result of elimination of unprofitable products and a decline of 16 per cent in U.S. car production as compared with the fiscal first quarter a year ago, sales for the three months ended September 30 declined to \$6,863,289, compared with \$8,331,132 last year," he said.

In the building products field the company plans a 10,000 square foot addition to its window and door plant at St. Clair, Michigan, and has a backlog of \$600,000 in orders for stainless steel architectural windows.

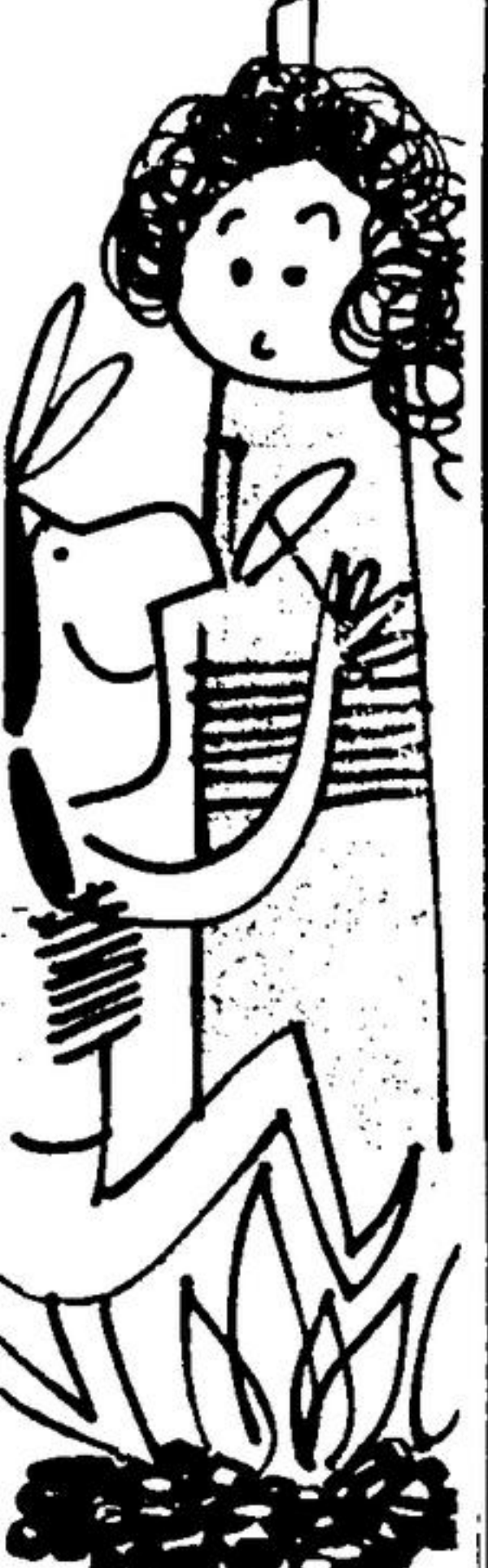

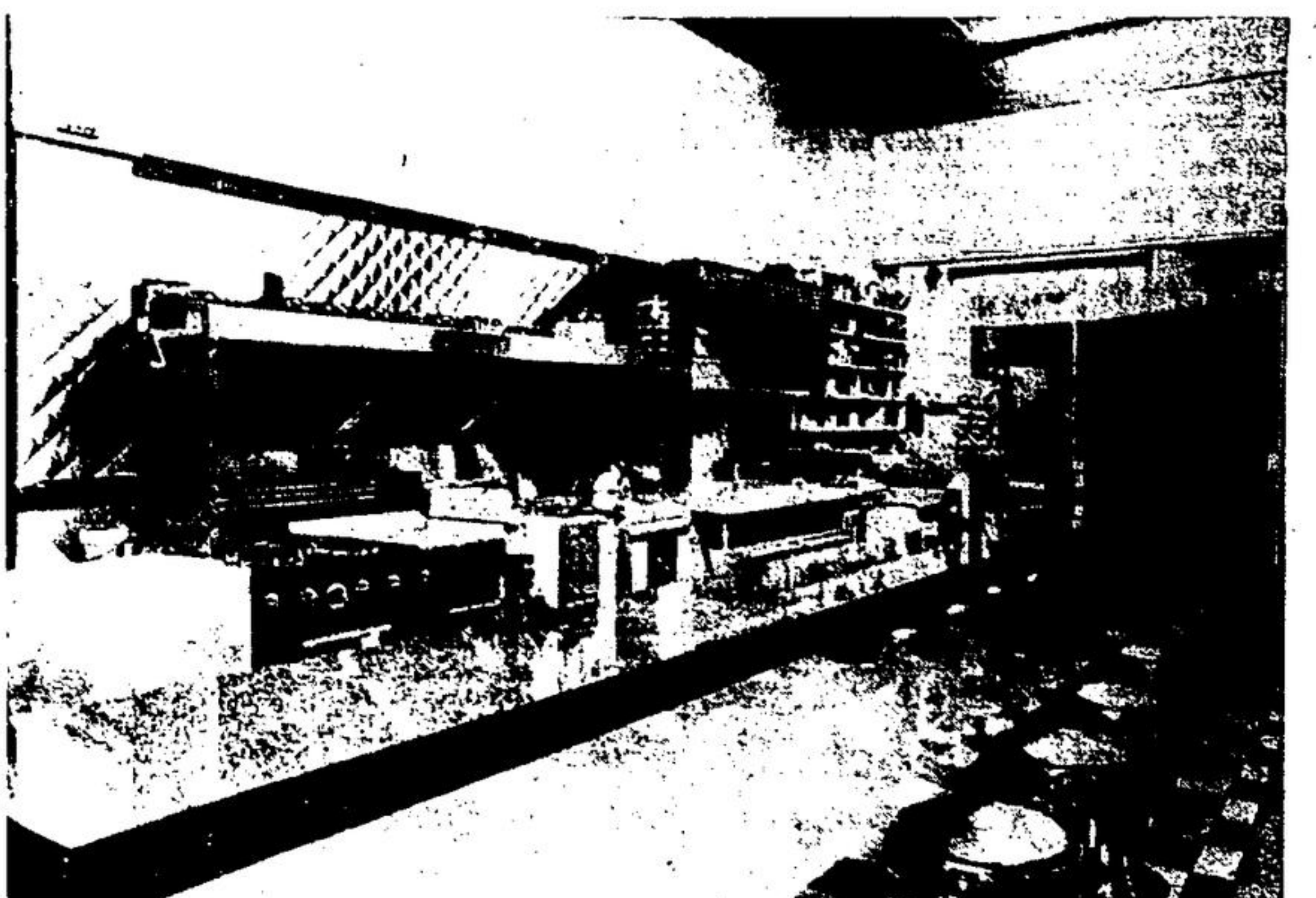
Robert McNeill, who has announced himself as a council candidate this year, appeared at the meeting saying he had in the matter," he remarked.
