Rumours Not True Of Congo Beatings

Ottawa (Special): A report that a number of Canadian troops who had served in the Congo have been discharged for medical reasons as the result of beatings suffered from native Africans, has been denied here by Army authorities.

Army authorities, who made a close check of medical records here, state that only two soldiers have been released from the Army since they returned to Canada from Congo duty. One man had recalled the normal end of his tour of duty in the army and the other suffered from a mental disturbance which preceded his Congo service. Army spokesmen admit that this latter soldier should never have been sent overseas.

The Canadian U.N. contingent in the Congo is changed every six months, and, at present, the third group of soldiers is now in service there. In addition, 80 Canadian airmen reported for Congo duty last month. A total of 60 Army Officers and 386 other ranks have seen Congo service and returned home.

The army says that 35 Canadian soldiers have suffered from death, injury or illness on Congo duty. One of these died as the result of a heart attack. About two-thirds of the total were the result of arrest and mistreatment at the hands of Congolese.

To check on the report, Army authorities put the record cards of the Congo troops through their IBM machines and also made a personal check of each man's file.

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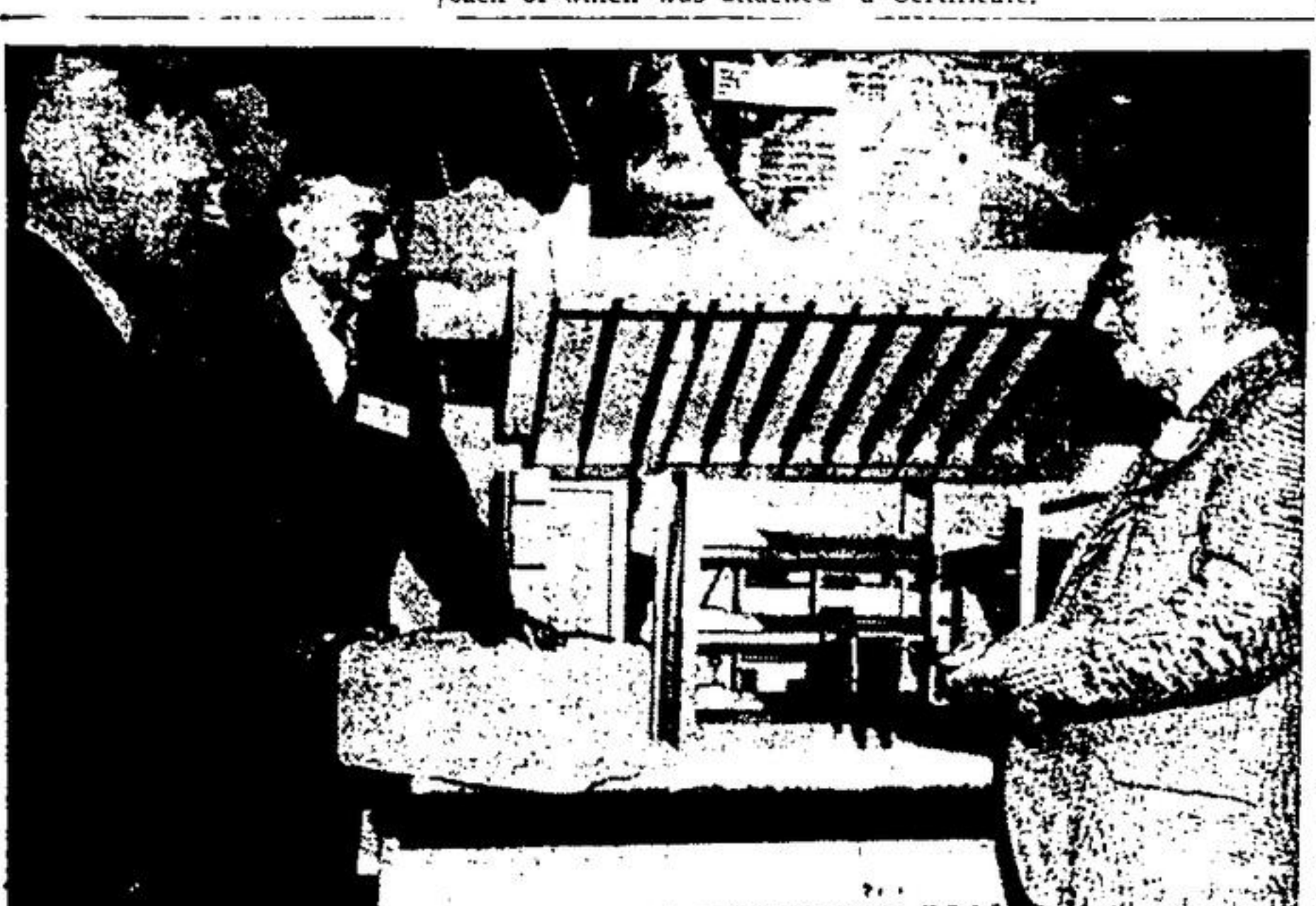
