## Newspaper Article Draws Police Ire

A letter from Georgetown Police Association read at Monday's council meeting denied any responsibility for an article appearing in the Georgetown Leader last week.

The association has asked neither shorter hours, more pay nor a new police building, the letter said, and was printed entirely on its own by the newspaper.

"Mr. Kewley said there would be printed clarification in the next issue," it concluded. "It was surprised at this item," said police chairman Wm. F. Hunter, "and I have had several phone calls about it. We have had full agreement with the police this year."

"I'm surprised so many took this thing seriously," said Cr. Ian Cass.

Cr. Hunter later criticized a reference in the Leader to his stand on voting on a motion amendment to the subdivision by-law last week and refraining from voting on the motion itself.

"The Cass-Sargent motion had never been discussed in committee and had nothing to do with the Moore farm," he said. "It would have reduced assessment by \$250 in the ratio scale and I was against that. I was the only one who stuck up for paved roads in subdivisions when we passed the by-law last year."

Cr. Cass said he thought last week's motion had nothing to do with Moore Park but that he thought Cr. Hunter should either have voted or refrained from both motions.

"The councillor had the right to vote or not as he wished," said Mayor Hyde.

"I contacted a lawyer and he said I was in order to vote on the motion if I wanted to," added Cr. Hunter.

Mayor Hyde completed the night's 'hat trick' when he said he wished to correct a Leader statement that suggested the town had lost \$12,000 in welfare grants last year.

"Total welfare and institutional care cost the town \$2,476.49 in 1960," he said. "We would have a time getting a \$12,000 government subsidy on that."

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## Who Gets Credit By-Law Drawback

"Who decided who is to be credited with new industrial assessment?" was the poser placed before council by Deputy Reeve Elliott Monday.

The discussion took place after a by-law amendment adjusting certain provisions of the subdivision control by-law which sets the proportion of residential building allowed for certain industrial-commercial requirements in a development.

Mayor Hyde opened that a committee has discussed this and it is one of the drawbacks in the by-law.

"We must attempt to avoid childish squabbles about who gets what, and it is council's decision in the final analysis," he said.

The deputy reeve said a letter from the industry concerned could be helpful in a decision.

The planning committee was asked to study the problem further.
