

Raiders Split Pair of Games With Oakville

Georgetown Raiders and Oakville Oaks traded Sunday punches on the weekend in an explosive home and home series that rocked first the Oaks and then the Raiders back on their heels. Playing with just two defencemen and shorthanded through out a big part of the contest the locals buried Oaks with a Niagara of rubber for forty minutes then survived a third period uprising to claim their opening night win 7 to 5. But on the home pond of the black and gold, Elmer Lee's charges couldn't approach their Friday performance.

Making a Sunday night debut in front of their customers the Oaks pulled the rug from under their conquerors and sent them home with bruises, the odd chary horse, and an 8-3 loss. Friday's clash resulted in some post-game head scratching. Oakville, it was obvious after half a period, lacked the Raiders' good condition. They were slow picking up their checks and lost consistently in the corners. Still, they stepped up their pace as the game progressed and were accelerating in the third frame and crossed paths with the slipping locals somewhere around the early minutes of the finale.

The game also marked the return of Nick Ferri to a Raider's uniform and though the hippy-hop was missing Nick's hockey sense and play making was still very much in evidence. Working with Frazer Dunn and Dave Irons on a potentially potent line, the long time local favourite was just what the doctor ordered to fill a gap up front.

Raiders built a three goal cushion the first frame on goals by Varey from Magdy; Junior Beaumont from Varey and Blake Inglis; and Frazer Dunn unassisted, all between the 4:10 and the 8:26 mark. Wayne Thompson from Dem- orse and Magdy tallied in the middle period before Oakville got on the score sheet when Bill Ford, the playing coach, beat Trotta about midway through the game. Dave Irons from a difficult angle 4 minutes later, and then Beaumont from Blake Inglis and Varey with 25 seconds left in the period enabled Georgetown to skate off with a 7-1 bulge. It came in handy. Rogers started the Oakville rally that fell short with his marker after almost 12 minutes had gone in the last frame. Bruce Brown followed this up and Bud McKay and then Rogers again took turns in poking holes in the tired Raider rear-guard.

Georgetown got an early taste of a second victory when they took a brief lead in the first period in Oakville Sunday, but that was as close as they came. Oakville led 3-2 at the end of the first period, and had a 5-2 spread going into the third. They deserved the edge. The game was five minutes old when Jack Rogers put his club in front with a lead that stood up for less than a minute. Bob Demerse from Wayne Thompson and Gord Thompson was the combination that tied it, and at 15:57 Doug Richardson took a pass from Blake Inglis and put Raiders into a 2-1 lead. Bruce Brown and Murray Armstrong tallied in quick succession to burst the bubble before the end of the period.
