**Deputy Reeve Chairs
Emergency Measures**
Says Town Standfast Area if Nuclear Attack
After a lengthy discussion between the County Co-ordinator of Emergency Measures Bruce McGregor, and representatives of ambulance, police, welfare, assessment department, engineering department and council, it was decided that the chairman of the Emergency Measures Planning Committee would be at present chairman of the Civil Defence Committee of Council. At the moment this is Deputy Reeve John Elliott.
An original recommendation suggested the Emergency Measures Planning Committee be composed of the heads of town departments, with the Clerk or Deputy Clerk as chairman. However, this idea was not enthusiastically received by those concerned.
Co-ordinator Bruce McGregor stated that it would be the Committee's responsibility to study requirements and make recommendations to Council. He claimed Georgetown and Acton could be considered standfast areas. He claimed further, that 82% of the time the wind is blowing from west to east in this area, thus lowering the chances of fallout from any attack on the lakeshore.
He emphasized that Emergency Planning is for any type of disaster, not necessarily nuclear disaster. The installation of the two-way radio on the fire equipment will be invaluable, he added.
In reply to a question on financing, he explained that the Federal government pays 75% of the cost, the province 15% and the County 10%. There is no direct cost to the municipality, however, their share is included in the County Levy.
Councillor I. Cass remarked: "We should decide what form
