Urge Farm Caution In Electricity Use

At the Zone Conference of the Ontario Farm Safety Council held recently in Wentworth county, J. H. Taylor, Chairman of the Halton Farm Safety Council, presented the activities in farm accident prevention in Halton.

Mr. Taylor was one of five delegates from Halton attending the Conference. The Ontario Farm Safety Council and its affiliated County groups are promoting programmes to assist in lowering the farm accident rate on Ontario farms.

The Conference was under the chairmanship of Mr. H. E. Wright, Farm Safety Specialist for Ontario Department of Agriculture. Mr. Wright outlined many of the accident hazards and stressed the proper use of electricity on the farm.

In his remarks he stated that the majority of farm electrical circuits are of number fourteen wire and using larger than 15 ampere fuses creates a hazard. When fuses continually blow in one circuit it is important to decrease the load on the circuit and have an electrician install another circuit. If larger fuses are used, sufficient heat may be generated in the wire to char the insulation and start a fire. Here are some precautions to follow:

Don't replace fuses while standing on a wet floor unless you first pull the main switch.

Don't handle appliances or cords while in contact with water.

Don't attempt to make electrical repairs yourself.

The use of electricity on the farm increases each year and many wiring installations are low standard. Mr. Wright suggested employing an electrician familiar with the farm
