

RON CLARK'S "AQUABAT" SKIPS FROM POND TO PRECIPITATION

The "Aquabat", a versatile vehicle which is the personal brainchild of Avian Aircraft engineer, Ron Clark, has made its metamorphosis from water sprite to snowmobile and according to Clark, skimming over the precipitation is just as much fun as cutting the clean waters of a northern lake.

"Aquabat" is the newest concept is outboard hydroplanes. Because she is fast and because of her excellent stability and safety in handling this craft will give all the thrills and excitement boating has to offer.

"Aquabat" is extremely safe due to its unsinkable qualities. Throughout its construction there is a series of sealed compartments. The total weight of the finished hull is 125 lbs. including hardware and accessories. Speeds of 30 mph can be attained with outboard motors in the 10 h.p. class.

The Aquabat is easily converted from an outboard hydroplane to a snappy ice or snow-cycle. Twenty minutes is all that is required to attach the three skis to the existing fittings in the basic hull. The construction of the skis is such that runners are built in for riding across the ice. Airdrive power is a necessity for winter travel. With an airdrive motor mounted on the transom the driver can utilize this craft to his own advantage, whether for cross country runs or for easy access to his fishing cabin.

The particular Airdrive outboard shown is a 4 h.p. model. An engine of this size can send you skimming over the ice with speeds up to 30 mph while a 20 hp engine is required for travel in snow. This Airdrive outboard has a total weight of twenty-eight pounds. Transporting and ease of handling are provided by a neatly folding safety screen. Twist grip throttle and adjustment for any transom are some of the features.

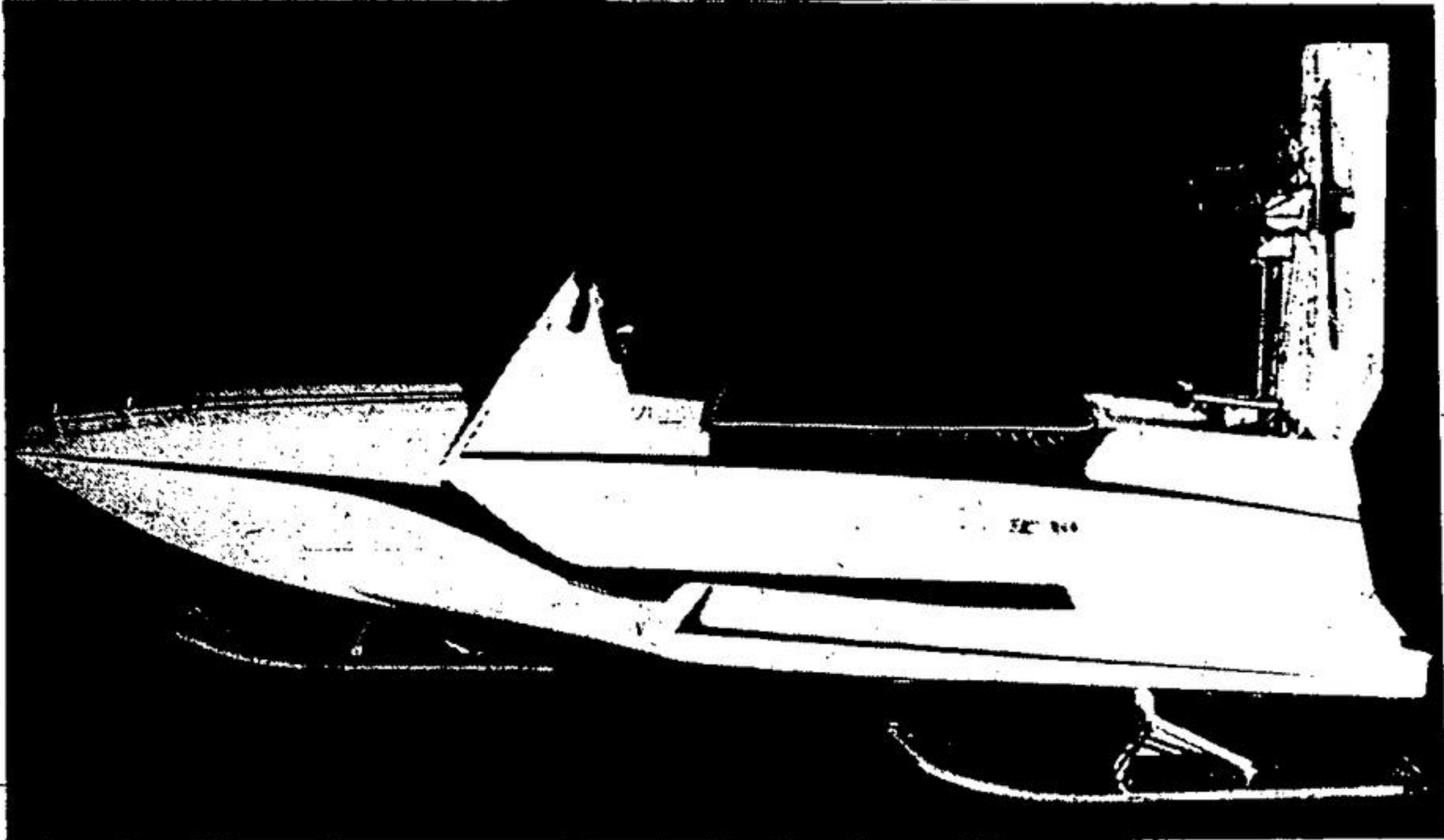
Airdrive outboards can be used separately of course, on canoes and car top boats. Hunters and fishermen can take themselves to inaccessible spots where the conventional outboard cannot travel. With no under-water appendages the airdrive will allow your craft to slip easily across extremely weedy and shallow water opening up better fishing and duck shooting opportunities.
