Active County Society Aids Cancer Education

A giant step forward in education, the establishing of dressing stations and service was made by the North Halton Unit of the Canadian Cancer Society during the past year. These facts were gained from the reports given at the annual meeting of the unit, comprising Milton, Georgetown and Acton, held in the Rose Room, Thursday evening, Nov. 16th.

Crown Attorney Peter McWilliams, Milton, chaired the meeting, assisted by the President of the Georgetown Branch, Mr. Reg Broomhead. Mrs. Frank Thompson, Milton, reported that their volunteer work group had completed over six thousand dressings during the year, but that they had not kept any mileage for transporting patients to hospitals or delivery of dressings. The Acton group was just formed this fall, but already are showing great progress in the establishment of their work room and in the film department where several films on the Cancer subject have been shown and commented on.

35 Workers
The Georgetown Group of volunteers for the making of dressings comprises 35 workers headed by Mrs. R. Wicks. These ladies meet every third Thursday in the Post Office workroom in the afternoon and evening. Two thousand four hundred and one dressings have been made with a great portion of them having been distributed in the Georgetown area already. Mrs. Don Peters who convenes the transportation committee has ten volunteers and drivers have driven approximately 1040 miles in the service. While giving her report Mrs. Wicks stressed the great help that the North Halton Health Unit nurses give. She also asked for more volunteers for the various types of work.

Each branch was greatly encouraged by the fact that there are so many calls for the educational films. Two films were shown, one on the prevention of smoking among juveniles and the second 'It's Nice to be Alive' dealing with the early detection of Cancer.

Cancer Story
Mrs. Minns, Woodbridge, District representative of District 12, of which Georgetown is a part, was the guest speaker, and her theme was the 'Cancer Story'. She dealt with the mechanics of the organization at each level. Her talk was most helpful to those present, particularly the newer members and guests who attended.

The president of the Georgetown branch announced that the Campaign Fund chairman would be Mrs. Reg Broomhead. Mr. Douglas Latimer who is the Educational Chairman has films with commentary available for any groups who would like to show them in the district. The evening concluded with Mrs. Wicks' and her group serving coffee and cookies.
