Margaret Ashdown Explains African Hopes, Ambitions Presented Cheque To Ghana College

Africa, its complexities, its people, its griefs, hopes and ambitions were some of the things that Mrs. Margaret Ashdown talked of to the Business and Professional Women's Club and their guests at the home of Mrs. Arthur Scott on Monday evening.

Mrs. Ashdown was the assistant on the Travel Mission of twenty-eight persons, eight of whom were Business and Professional Women, one of them a member of the Georgetown Club, Miss Bobby Kelly, which travelled to Egypt, Kenya, Ethiopia, South Africa, the Congo, Ghana and Nigeria.

Mrs. Ashdown is an excellent speaker and her sincerity, and her belief in and sensitivity to the African people and their problems, left a deep impression on her listeners. She said she felt that her mission was to try to instill in the minds of her listeners that these people have been done a great injustice over a period of many years by various countries. Great Britain, she felt, had the best record, having left behind many trained men and women who were better qualified to take on the reins of government than those countries left by France, Belgium and Portugal.

Better Life
She spoke particularly about the great desire for education by the African women. The work and sacrifices the mothers make so that their children can have a better life, not just in the three "R's" as Canadians know education but in health habits, combating disease, preparing and keeping food, nursing and the many things that go to make a better life. She told of one village who wanted a school and were told there was no money for a building but a teacher could be supplied. The authorities were amazed to hear very shortly that the land had been cleared and the villagers were waiting for tools to start building. This school was built by the women of the village who had to carry all the water, materials, etc. two miles up a very steep road. Mrs. Ashdown asked how many women in Canada would do the same?

Little Goes Far
The part of her trip that was most interesting to Business and Professional Women was in Togo, Ghana, where she presented a cheque for one thousand dollars from the Business and Professional Women's Clubs of Ontario.
