Galland, Mills Desert Toronto For Raiders Sailors, Guelph Bow to Locals in Games

When Georgetown Raiders invited the dynamic Toronto Mercantile club, Ralph-Clark-Stone, here for a pre-season exhibition till a few weeks back it was like bringing the super market to Mrs. Jones. Bargain hunters that they are, Raider brass, couldn't resist ogling some of the ICS material and even suggested to a few of the stellar types that the invitation could be made permanent.

Eager to ink Raider playing cards were high scorers forward Moe Galland, formerly of Toronto Lynx, who they represented Canada in the Olympics, and more recently the Toronto Firefighters before joining Ralph-Clark-Stone and a top flight rearguard Mark Mills.

Both Galland and Mills figure in the scoring Sunday when Georgetown Raiders registered their third win in four starts. A 3-2 squeaker over the new Guelph entry in the COHL. Friday night Port Credit made their 1961 debut here and lost out in a 9-7 shelling.

Following the pattern that dominated all their wins, Raiders skated to a 3-0 lead in Guelph Sunday and then gripped their teeth while Guelph called out the heavy artillery in the late stages. George Gray, Jerry Inglis (back from the Ontario trip), Gord Thompson and Mark Mills, made it tough for the rally to succeed. Junior Beaumont opened the scoring. Moe Galland potted number two and Wayne Thompson punched in the winner. The two clubs won't meet again until February 8th.

Evergreen Junior Beaumont scored 4 goals and came within hair on four other chances when Georgetown outbounced the hot and cold Port Credit sailors here Friday in a strictly offensive contest. But reasons of the teams' lack of defense were as far apart as Toronto's. With Raiders it was a weakness in numbers (they went with just two regulars while with Port Credit it was just weakness.

The ex-captain with the low centre of gravity scored his team's last goal, a deserved one after fighting close to 40 minutes ice time.

The Raiders carried a 2-0 margin into the second period on goals by Bob Demerse and Wayne Thompson, and opened the gap wider when Doug Richardson scored in the first minute. Jacobs and Richard beat Harry Smith with goals within seconds of each other to shave the lead, but local snipers only went back to work.
