



**GEORGETOWN OFFICER FLIES SUPERSONIC CF-101B**

UNDERGOING FLYING TRAINING on the RCAF's 1,200 mph. CF-101B jet interceptor is Flying Officer A. D. 'Doug' McArthur, 25, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. D. McArthur, 34 Market Street, Georgetown. A radio navigator with 410 all weather fighters squadron from RCAF Station, Uplands, near Ottawa, F/O McArthur, with fellow 410 Squadron aircrew officers, is based at Namao, just north of Edmonton, for a six week period learning to fly the CF-101B. F/O McArthur enlisted in the RCAF in September, 1954. He flew CF-100s with the 410 "Cougar" Squadron before being selected to fly the ultra high speed aircraft.

**Find Public Favor For Driving Instruction**

The Halton County Federation of Agriculture Insurance Committee conducted a survey at the three Fall Fairs recently held in Acton, Georgetown and Milton.

People 21 years of age and over were invited to answer "yes" or "no" to the following question: "Do you think that driving instruction should be taught in our High Schools?" To stimulate interest in the project, a pony and cart were offered at a prize.

The Committee feels that the results of the poll and the name of the prize winner may be of general interest.

Mr. Milton J. Brown, chairman of the Insurance Committee drew the winning card of R. Armstrong, R.R. 4, Acton, on September 30th, 1961 at the Milton Fair.

The results of the survey indicated an overwhelming majority (663) in favour of student driver training, with only 55 replies opposing such a program.

An optional question was also included on the questionnaire. Those polled were asked to indicate if they wished a representative of Co-operators Insurance Association sponsored by the Federation of Agriculture, to provide information on various types of insurance. The response was gratifying. A total of 192 requests were received; one hundred and sixty were from residents of the County and thirty-two from non-residents. (There were sixty requests for information on life insurance, either adult or juvenile).

An advertisement placed in the Georgetown Herald announcing the project and the prize, prior to the Georgetown Fair, assisted appreciably in the success of the venture.
